**Extend Invitation to Prominent Men**  
**President Cashel Says Johnson, Hill, Burke and Sarles May Attend**  
**DRAINAGE CONVENTION**  
**Which Will be Held Soon—Many Delegates Will Compose It.**

President J. L. Cashel of the North Dakota Drainage Association was in Grand Forks today enroute to Devils Lake for the big democratic jollification for John Burke. While here Mr. Cashel was seen by a Times reporter in connection with the coming drainage convention.

Mr. Cashel says that the convention this year will be a big one, and that he expects about two or three hundred delegates to attend from the Dakota side of the Red river valley. Every organized township, he said, has been invited to send delegates and commercial clubs, cities and the county commissioners have been asked to name delegates as well. Each organized township is entitled to one representative. The commercial clubs are entitled to one delegate for every 100 members, every city is entitled to a delegate for each 500 population and the county commissioners have been asked to name one delegate at large from their counties.

Some of the most prominent men in the northwest have been invited to attend the convention, among them being James J. Hill of the Great Northern, John Johnson, governor of Minnesota, E. V. Santee, governor of North Dakota, John Burke, governor-elect of North Dakota, State Engineer A. L. Fellows, Surveyor, Ralph of Minnesota and a number of others. These gentlemen will be asked to address the convention, and a formal program is being prepared which will be announced shortly.

The convention is to be held this year in Fargo on Dec. 11 and 12.

**JOHNSTON IS BOUND OVER**

**Contract Work of Local Firm Satisfactory to Blind Asylum Board**

At a meeting of the board of trustees of the Bathgate asylum for the blind, the contract work done by Daniel Bros., Grand Forks was accepted. The local firm had the contract for the erection of the brick walls and of the outside work of the building, which they completed some time ago. Owing to the fact that the appropriation has been exhausted, the board has been unable to go ahead with the interior finishings.

**SUNDY CLOSING LAW**  
**Russians Are Said to be About to Promulgate One—To Strengthen Position.**

St. Petersburg, Nov. 17.—The Russian government will soon promulgate a law providing for Sunday closing, under the provision for temporary legislation, the measure being avowedly intended to strengthen the administration's position in the electoral campaign. The project, which was worked out by the minister of commerce and is now being discussed by the cabinet, provides for closing stores and the cessation of work in factories on Sundays, except in the case of industries where continuous activity is necessary. Groceries and meat markets will be permitted to open for a few hours. Sunday closing was practically unknown in Russia, but during the last two years a powerful movement has been springing up, and has been partially successful in St. Petersburg, Moscow, and a few other large cities. Sporadic strikes in support of the movement are constantly being reported.

**CHASING "RAINBOW."**  
**Russian Rebs Send Their "Regrets" But Promise to Do Better.**

Moscow, Nov. 17.—The social revolutionists today issued a proclamation saying that they regretted the failure of the attempt on the life of General Rheinbot, prefect of police of Moscow Nov. 12, at whom a bomb was thrown by a revolutionist, and announcing that their efforts will be persisted in until successful.

President Newman and Mr. Brown arrived here in a special car and, after a conference, left for Cincinnati.

**AFTER WITTE'S SCALP.**  
**Russian Paper Demands His Expulsion Saying He Betrayed Country.**

Moscow, Nov. 17.—The Viedomosti of this city, a reactionary organ, published an article today demanding the expulsion of Count Witte from Russia on the ground that he is the empire's evil genius, and announcing that the ex-premier will remain in Russia at the peril of his life. In reactionary circles, the allegation is frequently made that Count Witte betrayed Russia in assenting to the treaty of Portsmouth, and inducing Emperor Nicholas to accept the reform manifesto of Oct. 30, 1905.
