

DEPUTY SHERIFF TO BE REWARDED

Ward County Official Who Arrested Canadian Thief Will Receive \$200

Minot, N. D., April 8.—Dickson Steinhof, deputy sheriff of Ward county, will get \$200 for arresting William Lambert Barr Duff on a charge of stealing three high bred horses from R. C. Brown at Moose Jaw, Canada.

This reward is offered and will be paid by the Canadian government. Judge Goss issued the commitment papers under which Duff was turned over to the Canadian authorities. Mr. Steinhof accompanied Sergt. Mundy and Duff to Portal, where Sergt. Mundy, who has been on the trail of Duff for some time, took charge of the prisoner.

UNIQUE CLAIM Is Raised By Cass County Resident.

Fargo, N. D., April 8.—Setting forth the facts that the cellar in his residence at Chaffee was flooded and practically ruined, while the place was under lock and key, branded as a nuisance by the district court of Cass county, P. O. Peterson asked the board of county commissioners to reimburse him to the extent of \$500.

ROW WAS FATAL

Inmates of Insane Asylum Had Hot Fight. Jamestown, N. D., April 8.—Julius Larson, an inmate of the violent ward at the state hospital for the insane, died as the result of injuries received in a fight with "Sooty" Wanamaker, also an inmate in the violent department. Wanamaker and Larson got into a scrap and the latter was overpowered and Wanamaker beat him up in a horrible manner before the guards could separate them.

ATTACH PROPERTY.

Bismarck, N. D., April 8.—Attachments are being made by the sheriff for delinquent personal property taxes extending over a period of six years, about \$30,000 of which has been discovered by a committee checking up the treasurer's office. One or two brick blocks in the city have been attached for neglected personal property taxes owed by the owners.

WIND UP THEIR WORK.

Bismarck, N. D., April 8.—The last meeting of the city council before the inauguration of the commission system was held Tuesday evening and reports of city officers were received. A report of the chief of police show thirty-eight barrels of liquors, twenty-two cases and one hundred and twenty-nine bottles of beer, eighteen quarts of whiskey and four dry-loads of unclassified liquor seized in the two years in attempts to enforce the prohibition law.

GREAT EQUITY SOCIETY MEETING

Will Be Held in Fargo Next June—Movement Is Spreading Rapidly

Fargo, N. D., April 8.—The Society of Equity is planning the largest meet ever held in this state. June 9 and 10 are the days on which the meetings will be held in Fargo, and the city will extend a warm welcome to the members of the society and their guests.

The main issue of the convention will be to work for \$1.25 wheat, and secure pledges from the farmers to hold their wheat for that price. The question of the society elevator at Superior will be an important one, and it is expected that by the time the meeting is held, the entire amount necessary to build the elevator will have been subscribed. A special feature of the meeting will be the adoption of the contest plan of securing members, this idea has been worked out with great success in Ward county, and much of the large increase in membership, is due to this special plan of work.

WAPETON TO HAVE LINE.

Wahpeton, N. D., April 8.—It is announced on good authority that a franchise will be asked of the city council of Wahpeton and Breckenridge, for the operation of an electric railway. Local capital, together with electrical experts from the east, are behind the proposition which it is believed will give the twin cities a street railway system. It is said that the introduction of electrical current from Fergus Falls had considerable to do with starting the move.

WILL DEPORT LUNATIC.

Jamestown, N. D., April 8.—United States Immigration Agent David J. Minneapolis arrived here for the purpose of taking charge of Marie Olson, an inmate of the asylum sent here from Ward county. It is the intention of the government to deport the Olson woman to Norway where she has relatives.

ANTI-TUBERCULOSIS.

Bismarck, N. D., April 8.—The North Dakota Anti-Tuberculosis association has been incorporated under the laws of the state. Mrs. E. P. Quinn, A. P. Lenhart, Dr. G. A. Rawlings, of Bismarck; and Dr. J. Grassick, president of the state board of health, of Grand Forks, are among the prominent ones of the incorporators.

ADD TO GROUNDS.

Bathgate, N. D., April 8.—Robert J. Currie has sold an additional twenty acres to the blind asylum board for \$90 an acre, the price paid for the original site. This additional ground was badly needed by the institution and will give advantages in the matter of building room and garden before entirely lacking.

BOLLEY A DEAN.

Fargo, N. D., April 8.—At the meeting of the board of trustees of the agricultural college, Prof. H. L. Bolley of the bacteriological department, was raised to the position of dean of the branch. The next meeting of the board will be held May 11.

CHANGE AUDITORS.

Jamestown, N. D., April 8.—G. E. Lyman, who has held the position of city auditor the past year, resigned, and C. R. Thompson was appointed in his stead. The appointment of Dr. W. A. Gerrish as city health officer to succeed Dr. Rankin was also made by Mayor Blewett.

WILL BEAUTIFY JAMESTOWN.

Jamestown, N. D., April 8.—The Jamestown Women's Civic league has commenced arrangements for an active campaign of this city, the purpose of which will be to beautify Jamestown. There will be a general cleanup week, while trees are to be planted in the several parks on Arbor day under the direction of the league.

FARGO MAY BE COMMISSION CITY

New Plan of Government Discussed at Business Men's Meeting Today

Fargo, N. D., April 8.—A meeting of the business men of Fargo is being held this afternoon at the call of President R. S. Lewis of the Fargo Commercial club, the purpose being the discussion of the commission plan of government which it is proposed to adopt in this city.

The question has been agitated for some little time but this is the first time it has been taken up on a public meeting.

HUSBAND MUST SHOW

Case County Case in Which Wife Transferred Land is Decided.

Bismarck, N. D., April 8.—The following decision has been handed down by the supreme court: Melvina Massey, appellant, vs. H. C. Rae, respondent.

1. There is no presumption that a deed from a wife to her husband is not valid, but upon a showing of mistake, fraud or undue influence through which the husband secures the wife's signature to a deed, while she is sick and weak through continued sickness, the burden of showing an adequate consideration, or that no mistake, fraud or imposition was exercised, is on the husband, and if he fails to show, in view of the relations of confidence existing on account of the marital relation, that no fraud was practiced, and that the deed was understandingly and voluntarily executed, and that the consideration was fair and adequate, the deed will be set aside.

2. Evidence considered, and held: To show that a deed from the wife to the husband was executed under circumstances that require the husband to show that no imposition or undue influence was exercised, and that the consideration was adequate, and that the deed was executed understandingly.

3. A new trial may be granted in cases tried under section 7229, R. C. 1905 in furtherance of justice where the action was dismissed on motion at the close of plaintiff's case and final disposition of the case can not, for that reason be made.

4. Relations of confidence will be presumed to exist between husband and wife in the absence of a showing to the contrary. The evidence in this case does not show that no confidential relations existed between the parties. (Syllabus by the court.)

Appeals from the district court of Cass county: Pollock, J. Action to cancel quit claim deed. Judgment for defendant. Plaintiff appeals. Reversed, and a new trial granted.

Glasford and Lacy and M. A. Hildreth, for appellants. Barnett and Richardson, for respondent. Opinion by Morgan, C. J. All concurred.

DICKINSON.

Dickinson, N. D., April 8.—In the city election for aldermen here Monday R. H. Johnson, Al White, J. K. Porter, Chas. Tear, John Maser, B. F. Crawford, Frank Wanner and J. Schafer were elected for the ensuing year. Election for the first time was held in the Fifth and Sixth wards, these being newly created precincts.

FESSENDEN.

Fessenden, N. D., April 8.—More than usual interest was shown in the city election which resulted in the election of John D. Conner for mayor, who received a good majority over the present mayor, C. O. Romansen.

Both parties claimed the right to be and were designated as the "Peoples' ticket." The entire ticket represented by Mr. Conner was elected and the officers elect are as follows: Mayor, John D. Conner; justice of the peace, W. F. Stroebel; police magistrate, Otto Neuenschwander; alderman Third ward, D. Engbrecht.
