

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SCARLET FEVER IS FATAL

Two Members of One Family Are Victims of the Dread Disease—Well Known Residents.

Hillsboro Banner: Scarlet fever in a malignant and fatal form has claimed two victims from the family of Mr. and Mrs. John H. Johnson, well known pioneers of Norway township. All that medical skill could do was done, and Dr. Anderson, the attending physician, called in consultation Dr. Grassick of Grand Forks, secretary of the state board of health, while experienced professional nurses were at the bedside of the patients continuously. But all proved without avail.

Edwin Johnson, aged 22 years and 5 months was stricken with the disease on Monday, May 17, and died on Saturday, May 22. His funeral took place on the following Sunday.

Theodore, his brother, 13 years and 4 months of age, was taken sick last Saturday morning and breathed his last about 6 o'clock Monday afternoon. His remains were laid beside those of Edwin in Aala's cemetery on Tuesday.

The sudden taking away of two beloved sons and brothers has been a fearful affliction for the family and expressions of sincere sympathy are heard on every side.

STATE'S WITNESS IS FORMER GRAND FORKS GIRL

Miss McCullough Who Charges Auctioneer With Rape Resided Here

W. T. POE CASES WILL BE UP NEXT WEEK

Other Sensational Actions Are Scheduled for Trial Before Judge Goss

Miss Marguerite McCullough, the complaining witness in the case against W. D. Kell, the Williston auctioneer who has been on trial this week before Judge E. B. Goss at Williston on a charge of rape, is a former Grand Forks resident. She made her home in this city up to last November, residing here about a year previous to that time, being engaged as a housekeeper for one John Stump, who is said to be a Great Northern shop employee.

The charge against Kell is one of the most sensational that has come to light for some time. She claims that last November she went to Williston from which place she proposed going to her claim shanty in McKenzie county. In Williston she says she became acquainted with Kell and he agreed to take her to the claim, saying that he was going in that direction.

They left Williston together and the next heard of them was three or four days later at Schafer, McKenzie county, when Kell was arrested on a charge of horse stealing. With his arrest on this charge, the girl made the charge of rape. The horse stealing charge was subsequently dismissed.

Miss McCullough claims that Kell attacked her during the trip, holding her a captive during the time. The case is before the district court and will be completed either today or Monday.

Following the Kell case there will be another case in which rape is the charge preferred. It is that of Manual Olson against whom a Toga girl has made the charge.

After this action an embelleyment case will be tried, D. W. Kelly being the defendant.

Then will come one of the big cases of the term, that of W. T. Poe, who is charged with the embelleyment of the funds of the city of Williston and of Williams county. A great deal of interest is manifest in these cases. They will probably be reached some time next week.

CHAS. H. ROBINSON IS CALLED BY DEATH

A Well Known Grand Forks Business Man Succumbs to Cerebral Hemorrhage

As a result of a cerebral hemorrhage, with which he was attacked Friday afternoon, Charles H. Robinson, at the head of the Robinson Commission company of this city, died this morning at about 5 o'clock at his residence, 112 Reeves avenue. Mr. Robinson was conscious for only two hours after he was attacked and from that time sank steadily into death. The funeral will be held Sunday afternoon at 4 o'clock from St. Paul's Episcopal church, Rev. J. K. Burleson officiating, while interment will be made in Memorial park.

The death of Mr. Robinson comes as a shock to the entire city. He had always been in the best of health until Friday, shortly after the dinner hour, when he was on his way to his office. At the corner of Belmont avenue and Fifth street he fell to the ground and those who rushed to his assistance immediately hurried him to his home. A consultation of physicians was held but his condition was so serious that nothing could be done to stay the angel of death.

Mr. Robinson has been prominent in the Grand Forks business world for a number of years. Prior to the time that he launched into the brokerage business, he was engaged as a traveling salesman and for a number of years he covered this city in the interests of P. H. Kelly & Co.

Mr. Robinson leaves a wife and two children to mourn his untimely demise, and in their bereavement they have the sincerest sympathy of their score of friends. He was 52 years of age.

The funeral will be held Sunday afternoon at 4 o'clock from St. Paul's Episcopal church, and the pall bearers will be James Elton, W. K. Nash, Thomas Corrigan, John Disher, Wm. Shultz and H. B. Finch.


