

SAVAGE CONFESSED TO BURGLARY AT MINOT

Man Arrested Here Owns Up That He Did Turn Criminal in Ward County

Word received by Chief of Police Overby this afternoon from Minot is to the effect that Henry Savage, the man taken from Grand Forks to the Ward metropolis Monday evening on a charge of burglary in the third degree, had made a confession, and that the goods stolen were recovered. Savage was arrested in Grand Forks recently and sentenced to thirty days in the county jail for vagrancy. Shortly afterwards an investigation was started with the result that a charge of burglary was lodged against him by the Minot police. The house burglarized was in what is known as Eastwood park, Minot, and nearly \$1,000 worth of cut glass and silverware was stolen.

HAVE FINE SEWER SYSTEM

Rugby Will Get in Line—Council to Take Action Monday—Plans Prepared Here

H. G. Lykken of the Northern Construction company of this city, arrived here Thursday from Rugby where he looked after some matters in connection with the installation of a sewer system in that city. The council of Rugby will meet next Monday evening for the purpose of considering plans and specifications that are being prepared by the Northern Construction company. The system will cost the people of Rugby in the neighborhood of \$12,000, and it will be thoroughly modern in every respect. The cost includes the construction of a septic tank. On June 12 the Town council will let the contract for an outfall sewer, the plans for which were also prepared by the Northern Construction company.

BIG WITNESS IN LIBEL CASE

Members of the Cabinet and Would Be Members Will Testify

Indianapolis, Ind., June 2.—Frank Hitchcock, chairman of the Republican national committee, Norman E. Mack, chairman of the Democratic national committee, members of the office staff of J. Pierpont Morgan and company of New York and certain officials in the departments of the government at Washington, are to be produced as witnesses for the government in the prosecution of Delevan Smith and Charles Williams, owners of the Indianapolis News, charged with criminal libel in publishing intimations that there was an enormous "graft" in the purchase of the Panama canal by the United States from the old French companies that owned the property. The government's attorneys, after the indictment of Messrs. Smith and Williams by the grand jury in the District of Columbia, made application to the United States court of this district for the removal of the defendants to the District of Columbia for trial. This order the court refused to make until satisfied that there was probable cause for the indictment and that the libel contained express malice.

Stuart McNamara of the department of justice at Washington and United States Attorney Miller of this district asked for a continuance, saying that since the court had decided to hear the evidence on the merits of the case, the matter had taken a wider scope than they were prepared for. The court demurred, saying that counsel should have anticipated his action and should have been prepared. Commenting on the Panama canal situation in general Judge Anderson said he thought the public had the right to question the conditions of the transfer of the canal because of William Nelson Cromwell's course before the senate investigating committee. "This forty million of dollars," said the court, "that was paid for the canal was the public's money, you must remember. Part of it was my money; part of it was your money."

FUNERAL HELD TODAY

Burial of C. A. Rheinart Took Place This Afternoon

The funeral of C. A. Rheinart was held this afternoon from the residence. Mr. Rheinart has been a resident of Grand Forks for many years and the services were attended by a large number of his friends. Interment took place in Memorial Park.

SHERIFF ARRESTED

Burleigh County Official Charged With Violating Law

Bismarck, N. D., June 2.—That times are getting strenuous is proved by the fact that on Tuesday the sheriff of Burleigh county, D. J. McGillis, was arrested on information filed in the district court by Attorney General Miller, charging him with permitting a building owned by him to be used for the sale of intoxicating liquor. The arrest was made under a law passed four years ago to aid in the enforcing of the prohibition law. It is believed that this is the first case of the kind under the law. The sheriff pleaded not guilty and was released under bonds of \$2,000. The arrest has caused a sensation here. The attorney general also caused the arrest of Joe Higgins and James Meyer on a charge of selling booze and they are also out under \$2,000 bonds.

BREWERS ROAST PROHIBITIONISTS

Say the Dry Wave Has Reached Its Height and Will React

Atlantic City, N. J., June 2.—Declaring that the "professional advocates of the Anti-Saloon league have overshoot the mark and that their statements are grossly exaggerated when they are not purposely misleading," the board of trustees of the United States Brewers' association, which opened its forty-ninth annual convention at the Hotel Shelburne today, went on record with the additional declaration that the so-called "prohibition wave" has reached its height and that a reaction is already beginning to set in. These statements were contained in the trustees' annual report which was placed before the convention with the reports of a number of the committees.

AUTO GOT AWAY FROM CHAUFFEUR

Took a Wild Race Through the Fashionable Quarter Before Being Stopped

Cincinnati, June 2.—A riderless automobile running wild at terrific speed, jumping across sidewalks, ripping up flower beds and shrubbery in Mount Auburn park and causing a panic among hundreds of men, women and children was the unusual scene in the fashionable residence district in this city last night. Joseph Faulkner, the chauffeur, was cranking up automobile when the machine suddenly shot forward at high speed. The clutch had been left on by mistake. Faulkner jumped onto the step but was crushed between the automobile and a row of trees, knocked unconscious and four of his ribs broken. Barney Lampo, a passerby, jumped in to the car and turned off the power.

DEGREE CONFERRED

Fargo, N. D., June 2.—Rev. H. G. Leonard of the First Methodist church received the notice of a degree of D. D. which has been conferred upon him by the theological department of the Northwestern university. It is considered a marked honor and comes from the department in which Dr. Leonard was a prominent student.

TRAIN ROBBERS WILL MAKE FIGHT

The Preliminary Hearing Will Probably Last Two or Three Days

Omaha, June 2.—When the three men charged with holding up the Overland Limited were arraigned before Judge Munger in United States court today it was apparent the case would probably last two days. The attorneys for the prisoners indicated that the government would be required to produce considerable evidence.

LAVENDER IS GIVEN THIRTY DAYS IN JAIL

Pleads Guilty to Charge of Assault—Other Cases Up in Court Today

The charge against John Lavender, accused of assault with a dangerous weapon with intent to kill, was changed this morning to assault, and when arraigned before Judge Templeton in district court, Lavender pleaded guilty to the latter charge. He was sentenced to thirty days in the county jail.

A verdict for the plaintiff to the amount of \$84.07 was returned by the jury in the case of N. B. Felton against Budd Reeves. F. B. Feetham was the attorney for the plaintiff and J. B. Wineham was attorney for the defendant. The action involved payment on a note which the defendant claimed was altered and outlawed.

The case of the City of Grand Forks against S. C. Whaling was brought for trial this afternoon. Attorney F. B. Feetham appeared for the plaintiff and no attorney represented the defendant. The case involves the violation of the city milk ordinance relative to keeping premises in sanitary condition. Cases numbered 14, 31 and 25 were placed on the pre-emptory call and will be brought for trial in rapid order, following the case now being tried.

BLACK HILLS ARE INUNDATED

Fourteen Inches of Rainfall Since Sunday Night—Half Million Damage

Deadwood, S. D., June 2.—For the first time since Sunday Deadwood has telegraph communication with the outside. A conservative estimate of the flood loss in the Black Hills is \$500,000. Both the Northwestern and the Burlington roads have sustained very heavy losses. Neither road has had a train into Deadwood since Sunday. Both lines will be obliged to bring in the mails by team for several days. At Spearfish the damage is \$200,000. Fourteen inches of rain has fallen in the Black Hills since Sunday night, breaking all records. Many mines have been forced to suspend work.

CLEARING UP THE MYSTERY

Dr. Cleminson Tells About His Wife's Attempt to Commit Suicide

Chicago, June 2.—The mystery surrounding the death of Mrs. Nora Jane Cleminson was brought nearer a solution today, it is believed, when Captain of Police Kane announced that he would examine a woman and man believed to be able to give information concerning the domestic relations of Dr. Cleminson and his wife. According to Captain Kane, Dr. Cleminson said today that Mrs. Cleminson had tried to commit suicide two weeks ago by taking chloroform. The physician declared that he had found an empty chloroform bottle and asked her about it. She denied having used any of the poison and at the time was believed by the physician. When he found her dead Sunday he decided, he said, to tell the burglar story because he did not think any post mortem would be held and that his story would be believed.

MILLIONAIRE FIRE FIGHTERS

Injured When Walls of Burning Structure Collapsed After Fire Was Subdued

Philadelphia, June 2.—Five members of what is known as the "millionaire fire company" were seriously injured today while fighting a fire which destroyed the large barn owned by Dr. E. W. Powell at Bryn Mawr, a fashionable suburb. The injured were taken to the hospital. They are: Thomas Moran, leg fractured; Harry Hicks, breast and arms crushed; John Litzenberg, back and shoulder injured; John Doyle, leg broken; John McCardie, injured about the body. All will recover. The fire was believed to be under control when the walls of the structure collapsed on the men. Several very wealthy men are members of the volunteer fire company with which the injured men are connected.

Alex. Ayotte to Have Charge of Operations at Ronan, Mont.

Missoula, Mont., June 2.—Alex Ayotte left here today for Ronan, where he will superintend the round-up of the buffaloes now on the ranges there. With Mr. Ayotte goes a band of husky cow-punchers and 50 head of horses.

The spring season has so far progressed that the animals are in a wild and ungovernable state. The herd has been feeding upon new grass and the bulls are heavy and ferocious. It is certain that trouble will be encountered in rounding up the herd, and a cage wagon, drawn by sixteen horses will be included in the outfit, it being the idea to cart such animals as cannot be driven by the riders. The herd will be brought into Ravalli, where there is a strong corral waiting, and will be transported thence in specially reinforced cattle cars.
