JACOB WELSH WILL BE CANDIDATE FOR OFFICE

Seeks Office of Treasurer—T. J. Hagen, Present Incumbent, Opposes Him

Jacob Welsh, 710 Chestnut street, will be a candidate for the position of city treasurer in the forthcoming election, having already announced his candidacy. Mr. Welsh has been considering the question for several weeks and has finally decided to enter.

Mr. Welsh will be opposed by T. J. Hagen, present incumbent, and that fact will lead at least a little interest to the coming municipal event. The new entrant into the treasury campaign has been a resident of Grand Forks for many years, and was up until recently, employed with the Ontario store in the capacity of collector. More recently he was associated with the Times-Herald in the same capacity, but has resigned that position to enter into the campaign for the honor of handling the city finances during the next two years.

Mr. Hagen has held the position for three terms, and is now seeking a fourth term in the same office.

BOA CONSTRICTOR IN STRAW PILE

Moorhead Farmer Made the Find Today—Reptile is Fifteen Feet Long

Moorhead, Minn., Jan. 25.—Phillip Jearreau, residing a mile and a half from here, today found a boa constrictor, fifteen feet long and five to six inches in diameter, in a straw pile on his farm.

The reptile is supposed to have escaped from a circus in this city last summer, taking refuge in a straw pile and remaining there ever since. The constrictor was in a state of coma from the cold, but was alive.

FREAK FIGHT OVER PANAMA

Yellow Assertions Made Before House Committee by Representative Rainey

Washington, Jan. 25.—American interests with the knowledge and cooperation of state department, "fomented" the revolution of 1903 in Columbia which resulted in the independence of Panama, according to Representative Henry T. Rainey of Illinois, before the house foreign affairs committee today.

The committee began hearings on Representative Rainey's resolution for an inquiry into the taking of the Panama canal strip by the United States. "I propose to show in this hearing that the declaration of independence of Panama prepared in New York in the offices of William Nelson Cromwell, and that Nov. 3, 1903, was the date agreed upon for beginning the revolution against Colombia," said Rainey.

"Our contention is that the part the United States played for months prior to this resolution is a stain on the history of this government and that we should make some financial reparation to Colombia for the damage done here."

YOUNG COUPLE WERE HOLDUPS

Only Seventeen But Series of Daring Robberies Charged to Them

Minneapolis, Jan. 25.—Henry Wilson, 17 years old, and Helen, his wife, the same age, were arrested at a local hotel today and are being held as suspects in a series of daring robberies in Minneapolis and St. Paul. A number of holdups are charged to the youth, and his wife is accused of looting hotel rooms in St. Paul.

COST OF EDUCATION IN THE STATE IS HIGH

North Dakota Spends Large Sum For Benefit of the Younger Generation

An idea of what education over the state costs can be gotten in the state auditor's office. State Auditor Brightbill has just completed a detailed statement which shows where the money has gone in the past year and also shows the amount paid all the educational institutions during the year 1911.

The common and city public schools have received \$4,874,823.27 alone, of which \$4,000,000 was from legislative appropriation, \$1,040,233 from fines and penalties, \$829,463.55 from school taxes.

The state university has received \$194,711.31, of which \$80,100.00 was received from legislative appropriation, \$25,628.23 from interest and income, and \$88,983.08 from the one mill tax.

The school of mines and forestry at Bottineau has received \$17,648.23 from interest and income, and \$28,627.75 from the one mill tax. The Mayville normal has only received \$60,367.45 from all sources including \$15,949.65 appropriation, \$10,927.04 interest and income, and \$33,490.76 from the one mill tax.

The Valley City normal received \$46,050.00 legislative appropriation, \$17,648.23 from interest and income, and \$28,627.75 from the one mill tax. The industrial school at Ellendale has received \$47,176.19 from all sources.

The academy of science at Wahpeton \$29,707.93. The school of forestry at Bottineau \$11,152.89, making a total of \$5,427,163.13 all the school and other educational institutions have cost the state the past year, to say nothing of the tuition money the different institutions have charged students and which they do not report in this statement.

CORA BERG WINS PRIZES

Larimore Girl Wins Two Highest Awards Offered at the State Corn Contest.

Cora Berg of Larimore has been awarded two prizes for corn in the contest held at Fargo. Both prizes are the highest given to pupils in this section of the state.

Miss Berg won the \$5 cash prize for the best exhibit of Minnesota 15, grown by school children in the northern half of the state. The same ten ears of corn took the first prize of a silver medal for the best ten ears of corn of any variety grown in the northwest quarter of the state.
