GIVES OVER \$1000 TO CHURCH

RING HOLDS THE GAS

INVENTION THAT DOES AWAY WITH A LOT OF TROUBLE

Makes Practically Impossible the Loss of Compression, Which is Such a Fruitful Source of Complaint.

Loss of compression is not often laid at the door of piston rings, at least not for a long time in the life of a car. But when a ring begins to permit gas to pass it there is but one remedy, and that is a new set of rings. Not infrequently the gas escapes past the ends of the rings, even when carefully fitted and particularly when all the ends of all the rings come in line.

To obviate this source of trouble one manufacturer has devised a ring that practically does away with any

such possibility, even when the ends are in line. Instead of the ordinary angle slot, the ends are dovetailed and there is a tongue and groove part as well, so that if properly fitted in the first place little gas would ever escape. Where such rings are fitted but one is used as a piston, this being the top one, as this is the ring that is responsible for the principal part of the duty of retaining the gas in the cylinder.
