IMPORTANT NEWS FROM THE NATIONAL CAPITAL

IN OUR WEEKLY LETTER FROM WASHINGTON, D. C.

The weather man was generous to
the residents of Washington this year,
especially the young folk, and allowed
us a day which looked like an old-
fashioned Christmas. To see the
ground all covered with snow is rather
unusual in this part of the world.

Despite the fact that the President
insists that there is no friction be-
tween himself and the Senate, facts
do not seem to bear him out. A num-
ber of presidential appointees have
been refused confirmation by the Sen-
ate and in most instances the names
have been sent back to the Senate.
The Senate feels that this is not right
and is considering cutting off the pay
of the recess appointees who had been
refused confirmation by that body.

A further source of dissatisfaction
arises from the fact that there are a
number of positions which could have
been given to democrats which have
been allowed to be occupied by the
former incumbents.

Tolls collected for the Panama Can-
al are said to have passed the one-
million-dollar mark on November 18.
Only two sailing vessels have used the
canal to date.

Lumbermen are protesting against
the collection of tolls for deck cargo
of lumber, they contend that

the tolls only apply to cargoes carried
in holds.

Here is a good chance for the ever
resourceful American inventor. The
annual egg crop is estimated at \$500,-
000,000. The waste in this crop is
\$200,000,000. This is due to break-
age in shipment and handling and
spoilage due to improper handling. It
is well enough to say be more careful
in handling the goods during ship-
ment, but this can hardly be done. It
should, however, be possible to make a
crate which will insure a minimum of
breakage. With the immense saving
such a crate would bring, the sales
thereof should be proportionately large
and profitable.

The Deficiency Bill, just passed by
the House, appropriates \$2,500,000 to
fight the hoof and mouth disease. This
disease is now said to be well under
control.

The Bureau of Chemistry of the Ag-
ricultural Department is seeking ways
to use dried potatoes. Dried pota-
toes may be kept indefinitely for stock
food and are less bulky and less ex-
pensive to transport than fresh pota-
toes. The desire for a wider use of
potatoes is due to the wish to make
this crop possible to be used in ro-
tating crops to maintain the fertility
of the soil.


