**IMPORTANT NEWS FROM THE NATIONAL CAPITAL**

IN OUR WEEKLY LETTER FROM WASHINGTON, D. C.

WASHINGTON, D. C. January 15, 1915  
The speech, delivered in Indianapolis last week by President Wilson, has occasioned much comment and especially that part thereof, which was taken to mean that he would seek a second term. The President, however, says he was not thinking of himself or a second term when he said "the people of the country soon might have an opportunity to pass upon the deeds of his administration", his thoughts were entirely of the administration.

The fact that the new interstate trade commission, the members of which will soon be appointed by the President, has authority to act as a tariff commission was not very generally realized until the same was pointed out by the President in his recent speech. The future revisions and changes in the tariff will, doubtless, be governed by facts collected by this body.

It is now considered likely that the neutral nations of Europe will join

in the protest of the United States against interference with commerce on the part of Great Britain. It is felt that Great Britain will ask a guarantee, from all neutrals, that foodstuffs, copper, etc., will not be re-exported to the enemies of the allies. This will of necessity bring the other countries into the controversy.

The Agriculture Department has changed the quarantine on hoof and mouth disease as far as the same affects Maryland by making the closed area "within three miles of infested farms" instead of five miles. The quarantine has been removed from twenty-nine counties in Indiana, twelve in Kentucky, all but twenty-four counties in Michigan, and from twenty three counties in Ohio.

The report for the week ending January 9th, gives the exports from the thirteen principal customs districts, as \$61,820,247, and the imports \$26,727,794. The balance of trade in our favor for the week is \$35,092,453. This was a gain in exports over the previous week of \$21,000,000.
