

GUTIERREZ FLEES FROM MEXICO CITY

El Paso, Tex., Jan. 18.—General Euillio Gutierrez fled from the capital with several members of his cabinet to escape assassination at the hands of Zapataistas, according to reports received here.

General Villa, with all the troops at his immediate disposal, is reported hurrying to the capital from Aguas Calientes.

It was said Villa and General Felipe Angeles, his chief of artillery, have decided to oppose the Zapata faction. General Obregon, with the main group of the Carranza army, was reported to be moving toward Mexico City after taking Puebla.

Whereabouts of Actress Causing Worry Among Friends.



TRULY SHATTUCK MISSING

Actress and Musical Comedy Singer Absent From New York.

New York, Jan. 20.—Truly Shattuck, actress and musical comedy singer, has been missing from New York two weeks. Her absence has caused worry among her friends.

It was said in the theatrical district that several letters she wrote a few weeks ago added to the worry, but the contents of the letters were not disclosed.

BRITONS WILL STOP FORMER GERMAN SHIP

Washington, Jan. 20.—The British government will not consent to allow the steamer Dacia, recently transferred from German to American registry, to proceed to Rotterdam under safe conduct with her cargo of cotton, the state department was notified from London.

While the text of the message was withheld it is known the British objection was based broadly on a reluctance to create a precedent, which, it is felt, would be followed by many similar purchases of German ships in America.

The objection to the transfer of the Dacia, according to the British view, is that it was not genuine, it being intimated the British government believes the American purchaser really was acting for German principals.

GERMANS ENDEAVOR TO OCCUPY YPRES

Amsterdam, Jan. 20.—"Heavy artillery fighting has been heard since early Monday around Ypres, where the Germans have taken an active offensive," says the Sluis correspondent of the Telegraaf. "Their efforts to occupy Ypres have thus far been unsuccessful. Many fresh British troops have arrived at this front."

The correspondent of the Telegraaf at Selssets, in the region near Ghent, wires that the Germans have issued proclamations forbidding the inhabitants to discuss the war under penalty of a heavy fine or long imprisonment.

"Some of the inhabitants have already been punished," he says. "In fact, the prisons are filled, not with ordinary criminals, but with citizens who have unwittingly been guilty of some infraction of the numerous German proscriptions."

DECLARES TURKS SUPPRESS NEWS.

London, Jan. 20.—The Central News has published a dispatch from its Athens correspondent, who declares that the authorities at Constantinople are suppressing the news of Turkish defeats in the Caucasus. They have ordered the execution, he says, of any one spreading unauthorized news reports.

Ban on Meat is Raised.

London, Jan. 20.—Cardinal Bourne has granted dispensation to the Catholics of England to eat meat on Friday and fast days. In a pastoral letter he says this step is necessary because of high price of fish and the usual substitutes for flesh.

Authoress is Given Divorce.

London, Jan. 20.—Mrs. Robert H. Sherard, the authoress known as Irene Osgood, was granted a divorce from her third husband, Robert H. Sherard, on the ground of misconduct and cruelty.
