Postmaster Herring is desirous of having the system working smoothly within a short time and wishes everyone who gets mail by delivery to drop either a slip or a card in the postoffice with their name and house and street number. From these a list will be made which will greatly aid the carriers in distributing the mail and will help the people along the routes to get their mail sooner.

#### CHANGES IN ROAD LAWS

In the session of the last legislature, many changes were made in the general road laws. The age limit in regard to the payment of the special road tax of \$2.00 was raised from 50 to 60 years before exemption and this is payable any time during the year by all male inhabitants of the state and is collected under the direction of the Board of County Commissioners of each county. This new provision will no doubt bring in an increased amount of road funds from this source as under the old law only persons residing in the State on March first of each year were liable, the result being that the large floating population who pay the greater part of this tax would sear off on account of not being in the state on March first. The road hog who refuses to give one half the road, while meeting another vehicle, for passing, be he either an automobile driver or piloting a load of hay, or if in either of the above cases if a driver refuses to give one half the road to allow the faster moving vehicle to pass the other, where both go in the same direction, the fine in both instances is \$25.00 or sixty days in jail or both.

Any person who throws tacks, glass, broken crockery or any substance or device whatsoever, in the public roads that will injure horses' feet or automobile tires is subject to a fine of \$50.00 or 60 days in jail or both.

#### JUDGMENT BEFORE PATENT NOT LIEN ON A HOMESTEAD

Lewistown, April 1.—Judge Roy F. Ayers has rendered a decision that is of considerable importance because of its bearing upon those sections where homesteading is extensive. This action was brought by C. H. Palmer against the Power Mercantile Company, to have decreed that a judgment secured by the defendant was not a cloud upon the title nor a lien upon a homestead of the plaintiff, patent to the land having been issued by the government last November, while the judgment was secured in March of last year. Judge Ayers declined to enter a decree for the reason that the matter is fully covered by section 2296 of the United States statutes and a decree would be a useless act. A demurrer was sustained but the decision sets out that under the law cited, a judgment secured prior to the issuance of the patent does not become a lien upon such homestead nor a cloud upon the title.

#### CLOSING LAW IN EFFECT

The midnight saloon closing law took effect in Montana on Thursday April first, and on Easter, the Sunday closing act becomes effective. The midnight closing provides that all retail liquor establishments in cities must close promptly at midnight, and remain closed until 8 o'clock the following morning. In unincorporated cities, saloons must close at 10 o'clock each evening and remain closed until 8 o'clock the following day.

Under the provisions of the Sunday law, saloons in incorporated cities must close at midnight Saturday and remain closed until 1 o'clock the following Sunday. In unincorporated places they must close at 10 and remain closed until 1 o'clock the following Sunday.
