


**BAPTIST CHURCH DEDICATED**

lecture room becomes a part of the auditorium proper. In this there is room for 100 chairs, and with the 180 opera chairs in the auditorium, the church has ample seating capacity.

In the basement of the church is the social or reception room, 34 feet by 39 feet in size. This room will be used for social functions and for the kindergarten of the Sunday school. Off this room is a kitchen, with a sink and cupboard and place for a range. Here the ladies may prepare for any banquets or suppers. There is also a furnace room and two lavatories and a storage room in the basement.

The building is indeed a credit to the men who built it and to those who bore the burden of getting the construction started and stood valiantly until it was finished. The entire cost of the property, including the lots building and furnishings was \$10,000,

and when you consider that all outstanding debts against the building have practically been taken care of, it is indeed remarkable.

Special praise must go to the pastor, Rev. J. Maurice Hupp, under whose guiding hand the work was begun and completed. Not content with seeing the building well under way, he himself stripped his coat and helped in the construction, assisting in the excavating, wheeling cement for the foundation, working side by side with the carpenters and with one other, did all the interior decorating and finishing. In figuring the work

done by the pastor on the building, it is estimated that it represents one thirtieth of the cost of the building. The problems during the construction were many, but Mr. Hupp overcame all of them and working like a Trojan, he was an inspiration to the men who worked by his side.

To the ladies of the congregation, due credit must also be given, for their work in getting the building started and in raising funds to apply on the building debt. In five months they raised \$900 which was put into the treasury of the church and in addition they have put in the furnishings at a cost of about \$200, so that in this time they have practically made for the church \$1100.

The church building would be a credit to a city many times the size of Glasgow and will remain for years to come as a monument of the spirit the dominated the small, yet large-souled congregation of the First Baptist Church of Glasgow. The pastor and congregation feel deeply grateful to everyone in the city who has helped them in their work and the result of their labors is indeed a just reward.

**NEW BILLIARD HALL**

The equipment for the new Orpheum Billiard Hall on Second Avenue South arrived yesterday morning and is rapidly being assembled and put in readiness for the opening on Saturday, July 3rd.

A short time ago, Mr. Harry Hess and Mr. M. J. Lynch took over the lease of Mr. Knowles, who conducted then in the same location, "Buck's Smoke House." All the old fixtures were taken out, the building thoroughly remodeled and repaired wherever necessary.

The new equipment consists of one billiard table and three pool tables, Brunswick-Balke make, with Monarch cushions. New cigar cases, a massive counter and cushioned chairs also came in the shipment. When everything is in readiness it will be one of the nicest and most complete billiard parlors in this part of the state, and those who enjoy playing the greatest of all indoor games will find this an ideal place in which to do so.
