**PROMINENT FARMER DIES**  
 Theodore Roosevelt, a prominent farmer living twelve miles east of Glasgow died Saturday morning from heart failure. While at the breakfast table Saturday morning, Mr. Roosevelt was stricken and passed away before medical assistance could reach him.

The deceased was born on March 8th, 1846 in New York City and when but one year old he was brought by his parents to Portage, Wisconsin, where he grew to manhood. When about thirty years of age he removed to Eau Claire, Wisconsin, and from there to 1907, to Montana, taking a homestead in Valley County, a few miles from the town of Nashua.

As a farmer he had been a success, and today his farm is one of the most valuable in the county. He leaves a host of warm friends to mourn his loss. The following relatives survive: Mrs. Ida Roosevelt, Arthur A. Roosevelt, Charles Roosevelt and Victor Roosevelt.

The funeral was held Monday afternoon from the Congregational church, Rev. A. U. Baer conducting the services. Members of the Odd Fellow lodge, of which the deceased belonged before his death, attended in a body.

### SHORT COURSE PLEASES MANY

The Short Course in Domestic Science of the University Extension work which has been in session here this week has been a decided success in results to those in attendance if not in numbers.

Those so fortunate as to be able to attend have found the work most delightful and instructive. Miss Katherine Jensen, who is instructor is an artist in her department. Her preparation has been thorough, covering a period of several years under some of the best instructors in the United States and today she ranks as one of the best in her line.

She studied for four years at the North Dakota State Agricultural College and spent one year at the University of Illinois.

Added to that is her pleasing personality and unfailing good nature and ready sense of humor.

The morning sessions have been devoted to the more scientific or technical part of home keeping and the afternoons to practical demonstration of dishes involving these principles.

Miss Jensen takes these scientific facts which seem so much like dry bones in our magazine articles and so vitalizes them that instead of being dull they are intensely interesting.

The ladies have watched her successful demonstrations in the afternoons with wonder at her proficiency and have enjoyed their portions of the dishes which they have seen prepared with delight. She has been assisted during this course by Miss Ethel Cooley, the charming daughter of Prof. F. S. Cooley, President of the State Agricultural School at Bozeman.

This University Extension work is a most wonderful opportunity to secure the benefits of advancing scientific research which is revolutionizing the world's work in all lines of industry and we are most grateful to those who are so generously leaving with us the results of years of patient investigation and research.
