WILL MEET COMMITTEE

Members of Commercial Club Will Accompany Party from Malta Here.

At the meeting of the Board of Directors of the Commercial Club Friday night, Mr. W. W. Schlecht, project engineer of the Lower Milk River Valley project completed arrangements with the Board for the entertainment of the Congressional Committee that will inspect the irrigation project along the Milk River.

The Commercial Club will send ten automobiles to Malta on the afternoon of July 12th, remaining there over night, and assisting in bringing the Congressional Committee and party to Glasgow on the following day. The plans for the day will be to leave Malta at 9:00 A. M. to visit the irrigable land between there and the Nelson reservoir, to inspect the latter and then on down through the valley, arriving at Saco at noon, where lunch will be served, leaving Saco at 1:30 and passing down through the valley to the Vandalia storage reservoir and dam, where an hour will be spent inspecting the project at that point.

From Vandalia the party will travel down through the lower Milk River Valley, covering the land coming under the irrigation project and into Glasgow, arriving here at about 5:30. The Congressional delegation will have dinner at 6 o'clock on their private cars, which will be brought to Glasgow on No. 28.

At eight o'clock in the evening it is planned to have the Congressional delegation and party as guests in the Commercial Club rooms where they will meet informally with members of the club and water users under the lower Milk River project.

No set program has been provided as this is the last series of automobile trips taken by this committee, who began their tour June first, and as it is realized that the committee will be tired out by the six weeks hard traveling, it is the plan of the Commercial Club not to tire them further with any formal speeches or tiresome program. The main object of the meeting in the club rooms on the evening of July 13th is to give the Congressional delegation an opportunity to talk informally with the water users and to get the actual facts showing the advisability and benefits to be derived from a great increased development in agricultural products by having the present irrigation project completed. The desire of the Commercial Club is to make the session at the club rooms as pleasant for the visitors as possible. Plans for the entertainment of the visitors are in the hands of J. P. McIntyre, Chairman of the Entertainment Committee of the Commercial Club.
