WASHINGTON LETTER
July 30, 1915.
Report has reached Washington of the arrest of Harry L. Wilson, a clerk in the American consulate at Berlin. Mr. Wilson was arrested by German authorities while attempting to leave Germany, at the Danish frontier, without a passport. The State Department is now investigating the matter. At the next session of Congress, Attorney General Gregory will recommend some increase in his force. This is rendered necessary by the extra work placed upon the Department of Justice in enforcing neutrality because of the European war and the conditions in Mexico. It may be that another assistant Attorney General and staff will be asked for to handle neutrality matters. Government deposits to the amount of \$4,970,500 are to be withdrawn from the national banks and remitted to the Treasury between August 10 and 25. The Treasury may, under the law, re-deposit this money with the federal reserve banks. An order has just been signed by Secretary Lane opening for settlement 2,000,000 acres of land in South Dakota. This land is situated in Harding, Perkins and Carson counties. The order becomes effective September 10. Secretary of War Garrison has given out a statement in which he says that the army reorganization plans will be laid before the President next week. Until these plans are finally settled upon the Secretary feels that the same should not be discussed for publication, as unauthentic statements at this time will do more harm than good. The latest statement from the Department of Commerce shows that the trade balance in favor of the United States has risen from \$7,000,000 in the week ending July 17, to \$22,908,443 for the week ending July 24. During the week ending July 24, the imports were \$31,213,917 and the exports \$54,122,360. ORDINANCE NO. 179
AN ORDINANCE TO PROVIDE FOR THE TRANSFER BY THE CITY TREASURER OF THE CITY OF GLASGOW, MONTANA, OF THE SUM OF FIFTEEN HUNDRED DOLLARS (\$1,500.00), TOGETHER WITH INTEREST AT THE RATE OF SIX PER CENT PER ANNUM ON FIVE HUNDRED DOLLARS (\$500.00) OF SAID SUM FROM OCTOBER FIRST, 1911, AND INTEREST AT THE RATE OF SIX PER CENT PER ANNUM ON ONE THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$1,000.00) OF SAID SUM FROM THE FIRST DAY OF NOVEMBER, 1911, FROM THE FUNDS NOW TO THE CREDIT OF SPECIAL IMPROVEMENT DISTRICT NUMBER FOUR OF SAID CITY OF GLASGOW, TO THE GENERAL FUND OF SAID CITY OF GLASGOW, AND FOR THAT PURPOSE TO AUTHORIZE AND EMPOWER THE PROPER CITY OFFICERS TO DRAW WARRANTS UPON SAID SPECIAL IMPROVEMENT FUNDS, PAYABLE TO THE GENERAL FUND OF SAID CITY OF GLASGOW;
WHEREAS, The F. C. Austin Drainage Excavator Company, a corporation, on the fifth day of June, 1913, in an action in the District Court of the Twelfth Judicial District of the State of Montana, in and for the County of Valley, wherein said F. C. Austin Drainage Excavator Company was plaintiff, and the City of Glasgow, a municipal corporation, was defendant, recovered a judgment against the said city of Glasgow for the sum of Fifteen Hundred Dollars (\$1,500.), principal, and Three Hundred Thirteen Dollars and Twenty-five cents (\$313.25), interest on said sum, together with interest on said sums at the rate of eight per cent per annum from said fifth day of June, 1914, until paid, together with plaintiff's costs and disbursements incurred in and by reason of said action.
AND, WHEREAS, the Council of said City of Glasgow, has determined not to prosecute an appeal from said judgment.
AND, WHEREAS, said Judgment is now a valid and subsisting judgment against said City of Glasgow.
AND, WHEREAS, the time for filing a transcript of said appeal on said judgment has heretofore expired.
AND, WHEREAS, it is deemed advisable by the city council of the city of Glasgow, and for the best interest of said city, to pay said judgment and secure a satisfaction thereof,
AND, WHEREAS, the Court in said action made the following findings of fact, and conclusions of law, to-wit:
FINDINGS OF FACT
Herein the court upon the evidence adduced and admissions in the pleadings makes the following findings of fact:
I. That since on or about the first day of July, 1911, the plaintiff has been at all times and still is a corporation, organized under the laws of the State of Illinois.
II. That since on or about the 25th day of April, 1911, the defendant has been and still is a municipal corporation, having all the powers, privileges and duties of a municipal corporation, organized under the laws of the State of Montana.
III. That the defendant succeeded to all the rights, duties, obligations and liabilities of the Town of Glasgow, which was a municipal corporation from June, 1902, to the 25th day of April, 1911.
IV. That on or about the 22nd day of March, 1911, the town council of the Town of Glasgow, by a resolution duly and regularly adopted and approved, created special improvement district No. 4 in said town for sewer purposes and authorized the issuance of special district warrants of said district.
V. That on the 21st day of April, 1911, the Town of Glasgow, entered into a contract with one J. S. Penson, to construct a sewer in said special improvement district No. 4, under the terms of which contract it was agreed that said Penson would accept in payment for said work warrants of special improvement district No. 4.
VI. That said contract became obligatory upon the defendant, City of Glasgow, when it became a city on or about the 25th day of April, 1911, and that said defendant thereafter assumed to carry out the terms and conditions of said contract.
VII. That prior to the 12th day of July 1911, said Penson had partly constructed the sewer in said special improvement district and on the said 12th day of July, 1911, was engaged in the construction of said sewer in said district.
VIII. That said Penson continued thereafter in the work of constructing said sewer until on or about the 8th day of November, 1911.
IX. That on or about the 12th day of July, 1911, said J. S. Penson executed and delivered to the plaintiff an assignment of twenty-five hundred (\$2500) dollars of special improvement district sewer warrants, to be issued to said Penson and delivered to the plaintiff in the following installments: \$500.00 on September 1st, 1911. \$1,000.00 on October 1st, 1911, and \$1,000.00 on November 1st, 1911. A copy of which assignment was delivered to the defendant and retained and accepted by it.
X. That by the contract referred to in said assignment as of the date of May 20th, 1911, was meant the contract entered into April 21st, 1911, between the said Penson and the Town of Glasgow, and by the Special Improvement District Sewer warrants referred to in said assignment was meant the warrants of Special Improvement District No. 4 of the City of Glasgow, and the defendant and plaintiff at all times after the execution of said assignment so understood and interpreted it.
XI. That the defendant delivered to the said J. S. Penson after the execution of said assignment warrants of Special Improvement District No. 4 as follows: August 1st, 1911.....\$3000.00 August 24th, 1911.....\$3000.00 September 27th, 1911.....\$3000.00 October 11th, 1911.....\$1000.00 November 8th, 1911.....\$750.00
XII. That on November 8th, 1911, a writ of attachment was served upon the defendant in an action wherein Lewis-Wedum Company was plaintiff and J. S. Penson was defendant, by reason of which, the defendant refused to deliver to said J. S. Penson, a warrant issued on the 8th day of November, for the sum of two hundred fifty (\$250) dollars and which said warrant was afterwards delivered to the Lewis-Wedum Company, by the defendant.
XIII. That in addition to the amount of warrants referred to in the preceding paragraphs, said J. S. Penson earned under his contract heretofore mentioned, approximately twenty-six hundred (\$2,600.00) Dollars, which was in the possession of the defendant at the time of the institution of this action.
XIV. That the plaintiff prior to the institution of this action received from J. S. Penson on behalf of the defendant, warrants of said special improvement district No. 4, amounting to five hundred (\$500.00) dollars, being the amount due to the plaintiff, September 1st, 1911 and on or about the 3rd day of October, 1911, the plaintiff received from said J. S. Penson, on behalf of the defendant, warrants of the value of five hundred (\$500.00) dollars, being half of the installment due on October 1st, 1911, and the plaintiff has not received any other warrants under its said assignment, nor has it been paid anything thereupon.
XV. That prior to the time when said installments of warrants were required under the assignment to be delivered by the said defendant to the plaintiff, the said J. S. Penson, has earned sufficient money a sufficient sum of money was due to the said J. S. Penson at the time when each of said installments became due, to enable the defendants to pay each and all of said installments in full when due.
XVI. That the defendant has at all times since said dates refused to deliver to said plaintiff, said warrants as required by said assignment and said defendant, has at all times since notice of said assignment was served upon it wholly disregarded said assignment.
XVII. That on the 12th day of January, 1912, the plaintiff presented to the defendant its claim duly verified, demanding the sum of fifteen hundred (\$1500.00) dollars in any warrants of the said city of the sum of fifteen hundred (\$1500.00) Dollars in money, which claim the said defendant refused to consider and by its refusal to do so rejected it.
XVIII. That said claim was a valid claim against the defendant and in favor of the plaintiff.
XIX. That the plaintiff will be fully compensated by payment to it by the defendant of the sum of fifteen hundred (\$1500.00) Dollars in money with interest at eight per cent per annum on the sum of five hundred (\$500.00) dollars thereof from October 1st, 1911, and with interest on one thousand (\$1,000.00) Dollars thereof at eight per cent per annum from November 1st, 1911.
XX. That all the allegations of the plaintiff's complaint are true. Dated this 5th day of June, 1914. J. E. ERICKSON, Judge.
CONCLUSIONS OF LAW
By reason of the findings of fact hereinbefore made, the court concludes as matters of law,
I. That the defendant, the City of Glasgow, Montana, was obligated to deliver to the plaintiff, warrants of Special Improvement District No. 4 of said City, as follows: \$500.00 on September 1st, 1911. \$1,000.00 on October 1st, 1911. \$1,000.00 on November 1st, 1911.
II. That the failure of said city to deliver to the plaintiff the warrants pursuant to the terms of said assignment the said defendant city became liable to the plaintiff in the amount of fifteen hundred (1500.00) dollars, with interest on the sum of five hundred (500) dollars, at the rate of eight per cent from the 1st day of October, 1911, and interest on the sum of one thousand dollars (\$1,000.00) from the 1st day of November, 1911. Let judgment be entered accordingly. J. E. ERICKSON, Judge.
AND, WHEREAS, the warrants mentioned in said findings and conclusions of law have not been delivered to said F. C. Austin Drainage Excavator Company or anyone in its behalf, except as therein mentioned.
AND, WHEREAS, said judgment has not been paid,
AND, WHEREAS, there is now a surplus in excess of said sum of fifteen hundred (1500) dollars and interest thereon as hereinafter specified, in said special improvement district fund which should be applied to the payment of said judgment to the extent of said fifteen hundred (1500) dollars and said interest thereon as hereinafter specified.
AND, WHEREAS, said judgment of said F. C. Austin Drainage Excavator Company must be paid out of the general fund,
NOW, THEREFORE, be it ordained by the council of the city of Glasgow,
I. That the sum of fifteen hundred (1500) dollars together with interest on five hundred (500) dollars of said sum from the first day of October, 1911, at the rate of 6 per cent per annum, and interest on one thousand (1000) dollars of said sum from the 1st day of November, 1911, at the rate of 6 per cent per annum, be

C. Austin Drainage Excavator Company, as assignee of said J. S. Penson.
