

POISONED BY BERRIES

George Irvine of Saco Eats Poisonous Fruit and Succumbs

George Irvine of Saco died Tuesday afternoon as a result of eating some berries. He was working as a farm hand on Frenchman Creek and in the afternoon ate some berries that he thought were Buffalo berries. About two hours later he was taken violently ill, and while being taken to Saco for medical treatment he died. The deceased was about thirty years of age and had worked in the vicinity of Saco for some time. The berries which were the cause of his death, are thought to be Juniper berries.
