

# Commissioners' Proceedings

## Official Proceedings of the Board of County Commissioners at the Regular September Meeting

At 9 o'clock a. m., September 7th, 1915, Board of County Commissioners of Valley County, Montana, met pursuant to law, Peter A. West, Carl J. Anderson, C. W. Baylor, Commissioners and W. B. Shoemaker, Clerk, present.

Minutes of last regular meeting and intervening sessions were read and approved as amended, Clerk being instructed to insert the proceedings with reference to Bond Issue of \$143,000.00 as supplemental of August 3rd, 1915.

Mr. G. E. Keeler of Keeler Bros. of Denver, Colorado, appeared before the Board with \$143,000.00 funding Bonds and Board proceeded to examine contract and provisions of Bonds, Attorney G. E. Hurd assisting and explaining the provisions of the Agreement, and calling attention to the fact that Bonds bear date of July 1, 1915, and that in his opinion the Bond Company should pay accrued interest to date of delivery of Bonds and calling attention to change made with reference to levy of tax to take care of interest and principal when due.

The Board concurred with Mr. Hurd in this opinion and Mr. Keeler agreed to the changes and made contract to pay accrued interest to date of delivery of bonds, and Board proceeded to execute bonds.

At 12 o'clock noon on motion Board took a recess until 2 o'clock p. m.
