SNAIL SUPPLANTING OYSTER. The helix pomatia, better known as the great vine snail, has replaced the oyster in stew, soup, fries, scallops, on the half shell and the palate as well as in price.
The great vine snail is not only edible but in France, where it is considered a great delicacy, it is consumed by the ton in the larger restaurants.
It is proposed to introduce snail culture as a sideline for dry-land farmers.
In the day of Caesar, snails were considered a great delicacy and were a part of the famous functions at which Epicurus presided, and whose recipes have been sought ever since.
Snails are now prepared in three general methods, and minor changes in the recipes, popular abroad, have been found satisfactory in California.
Doctors who have eaten snails say anything and unless guarded will become a disease carrier.
