

Andrew Shery lost four head of fine milk cows this week.

R. W. Garland, of Malta, visited Great Falls this week on business.

Robt. Walsh, of Hinsdale, was in Glasgow this week transacting business.

Miss Wheelock is visiting her friend Mrs. Al. Watkins of Nashua this week.

Thos. Dunn went up the road Wednesday on duty connected with his position as stock inspector.

Judge Vagg, H. H. Hedges and wife, Miss Wilson, of Saco, visited friends in Glasgow a couple of days this week.

Will Sherry, who was in town Wednesday, stated that in a patch of brush above their ranch he counted 110 dead critters.

Andrew Sherry is moving his household effects across the Milk river. He is going to locate a ranch at the Rock creek Springs near Hinsdale.

H. Robinson, of Saco, was among the visitors in town last week. Froin his contented smile it is evident that he has plenty of hay and his stock are not suffering.

Geo. Thayer (Ginger) left Glasgow Thursday for Pearmond where he will accept a position as cook under T. L. Blackman, of the Home Land and Cattle Co.

Sheriff Dan Kyle, who has been in Texas for the past two weeks, returned to Glasgow last Saturday.

Mr. Kyle said he did not see any snow south of Minnesota.

Mrs. W. H. Stonehouse arrived on yesterday's train from Iowa and will nurse her husband who had his foot accidentally shot off a week ago. Mr. Stonehouse is getting along as nicely as could be expected.

Tom McAllister was in from his ranch on the Missouri the first of the week. He reports that his stock loss will be heavy. He lost eight thoroughbred cattle among which was a fine imported bull in an air hole in the river this winter.

H. J. Peterson, of Culbertson, was in town Thursday. He reports that loss in stock on their ranges has been light considering the winter. He estimates that there are not over 100 head of dead cattle on the range between the big and little Muddies. This is certainly light.

Tuesday's reports from Boston show a sharper demand and firmer tone in the wool market than has been manifested for some time. Buyers who have held back are now in the market. Montana medium and fine were quoted 9 1/2 @ 11. Scoured price, 34; staple 36.

Willie Bohns, who was kidnapped in St. Paul by Minneapolis parties arrived on yesterday's train and joined his mother in Glasgow. The reunion was a pathetic one, the mother seizing the child in her arms and bathing him with scalding tears. Mrs. Bohns said she had no difficulty in securing the custody of her child from the Netter family. The boy is a bright looking little fellow, eight or nine years old.

John Survant, of Malta, foreman of the Circle Diamond outfit, was in Glasgow yesterday. He has had fifteen men employed this winter hauling hay and feeding 800 head of young stock that were driven in from the south last summer. In answer to the question, "how many of the trail cattle that came in last summer will you lose?" Mr. Survant said: "That is a hard question to answer. We drove in 8000 head of Southern cattle last year and I expect our losses around Malta will not fall very much short of 50 per cent. The storms have scattered the cattle all over the country and I have received reports from around Glasgow that estimate our loss down here will be as high as 90 per cent. The company intended putting in several thousand head more this year but in the face of such an adverse report I do not think they will do it."

He also said that the losses of Kohrs and Bielenburg, Milner Live Stock Co., and others would not exceed 10 per cent. as the native cattle were doing well. Mr. Survant will start gathering horses for the spring round up about the 10th of April.

Thos. Cushing, of Culbertson, has a claim of \$5000 before the Senate. The bill was introduced by Senator Carter. In 1871 Mr. Cushing was severely injured by the Unckappahs Sioux. He received a gunshot wound that disabled him. The pending bill proposes to deduct the amount of his claim from the Sioux fund.
