Wednesday noon, the order containing the instructions about the departure came, Col. Donohue of the regiment ordering Co. G to leave Thursday night for Fort Harrison. The men were highly pleased when they heard the report as all were anxious to get under way.

Owing to a shortage of equipment a third of the men were without uniforms or other equipment, but these will be fitted out complete when they arrive at Helena.

Out of the total number of men, Saco furnished 29. Recruits came down from there daily and every man was of the type that Uncle Sam wants as a soldier. This little town of about 300 population has certainly done its share in this crisis. The best young men in the town were taken away, but they went with a willingness that reflected the patriotic spirit of the city.

Nashua furnished several men, and Malta and Hinsdale are also represented in the company.

The company is under the command of Capt. E. N. Layton, and J. P. Sternhagen is the First Lieutenant.
