BACK IN THE RANKS

The unanimity with which the former members of the Progressive party throughout the country are responding to the patriotic appeal of Colonel Roosevelt to support the Republican ticket and thus assure a triumph of the fundamental principles in which the two parties are as one is impressively reflected in Oklahoma where the Republican vote was so large in Monday's primaries that there was a shortage of ballots.

It is a conservative assertion that at the present time eighty per cent of those who supported Roosevelt in 1912 are today back in the Republican fold, determined to do all that is in their power to bring about the election of Mr. Hughes and the restoration of the traditional principles of Americanism and Republicanism for which he stands, and as time goes on this percentage will increase despite the efforts of a few irreconcilables to keep alive the now subordinate issues which caused the schism of four years ago.

The Republican vote in November will be the vote of a completely reunited, aggressive party, and no one knows it better than the Democrats who are everywhere making such strenuous efforts to keep up the fiction that a third party still exists.—Billings Gazette.

NOTHING TO COMPLAIN ABOUT

The sympathy of Montana people goes out to those poor unfortunates in the east who are being killed or prostrated by the hundreds and made miserable by the millions as a result of the terrible heat. The temperature may go as high out here as it does in those suffering sections of the country, but owing to the altitude,

the dryness of the air and its free circulation, the same temperature is nowhere nearly so oppressive or debilitating.

Death or even prostration from that is unknown in this favored region and we really ought to be ashamed of ourselves to complain about the heat on these hot summer days. They are hot all right, but in comparison with what the people of most other parts of the country are compelled to endure, by night as well as by day, they are really quite comfortable.

The Democratic platform of this year does not follow its Baltimore predecessor by incorporating a declaration that the pledges of the document are made to be observed in office as well as to be used in seeking votes. The reason for the omission is entirely clear. The promises of the Baltimore platform were so much more uniformly honored in the breach rather than in the observance that the Democrats this year sought to duck the obvious and invidious and odious comparison. However, it is of small consequence, because the St. Louis platform is not the document which will be invoked during the next four years. The chart for this country's progress during that time was drafted at Chicago in the Republican convention.

G. H. Coulter of Culbertson has announced himself as a candidate for the Republican nomination for Clerk of the District Court in Sheridan County. Mr. Coulter has been a resident of Sheridan county for a number of years and has never before asked for office at the hands of his party. He has a host of friends throughout Sheridan county who will support him for the nomination and election. The Courier believes that the voters of Sheridan county can depend upon "Judge" Coulter to give them an efficient and economical administration.
