of, and charging such account with said warrants. And the book of record shall state the date of such improvement district warrants, to whom issued and the amount thereof, to the end that the cost of and the purposes for which said improvement district is created shall be at all times a matter of public record; and when such warrants shall have been redeemed and paid by the county treasurer of Valley County, State of Montana, as hereinafter provided, the respective accounts of said special improvement district shall be properly credited with the warrants so redeemed.

Section 3. Whenever a special improvement district warrant shall be issued by the Board of County Commissioners of Valley County, State of Montana, and said warrant shall bear upon its face the regularity of issuance, as prescribed in the resolution relating thereto, it shall be presented to the County Treasurer of Valley County, State of Montana, for payment, and if there are no funds to the credit of said improvement district fund sufficient to pay said warrant, it shall be the duty of the said County Treasurer to register said special improvement district warrant in a book to be provided for the purpose, and said registry shall set forth the number and the name of the said improvement district, and the date of registration of said warrant, and the amount of such warrant, and the person or persons to whom said warrant is issued, and the County Treasurer shall endorse upon the face of said warrant the date of the registration of the said warrant, and shall affix his signature thereto.

Section 4. It shall be the duty of the County Treasurer to prepare a book of record which shall be known as the register of Special Improvement Warrants, and whenever a special improvement district is created designated by proper name and number it shall be the duty of the County Treasurer to open in said book of Registration, an account with each improvement district, giving such account its proper name and number, and he shall enter in said book of Registration a proper record of all special improvement district warrants presented to him for registration or payment, issued under their respective districts as in the manner provided in section 2 of this Resolution. And it is further prescribed as the duty of the said County Treasurer to credit each special improvement district account from time to time as the same is paid, with all taxes and assessments levied against the respective special improvement districts and he shall apply the fund so collected in the following manner, to-wit:

FIRST—From the first money collected on account of any special improvement district, in each year, he shall provide for the payment of interest on or before the first day of January, in each year, to that date on any and all outstanding warrants of each respective special improvement district, whereon interest has not ceased by reason of said warrants being called for payment, and shall endorse said payment of interest on the reverse side of each warrant with the interest so paid, or by taking up and cancelling the interest coupons representing such interest, if such coupons be attached to said warrants; the first payment of interest to be computed for the period from date of said registration of each of said warrants to the first day of January next succeeding such date of registration and annually thereafter.

Second—Out of the remainder of any funds to the credit of such respective special improvement districts, the said County Treasurer shall then call in and pay warrants to the amount of such moneys on hand available for the purpose. So far as such funds will pay and retire the amount that may be due with accrued interest, to date of call for redemption and payment, fixing by notice the date whereon the interest shall cease upon such warrant and it shall be the duty of the County Treasurer to note upon such register the date of the call, and to notify the holders of said warrants by letter, if known, or by publication in a paper of general circulation published with the County of Valley, State of Montana, the call for the redemption of said warrants, and the date when interest on said warrants shall cease.

Section 5. It shall be the duty of the said County Treasurer at any time after the redemption and payment of any special improvement district warrants, as hereinbefore mentioned, to cancel and deliver the same to the County Clerk and Recorder of Valley County, State of Montana, and to take his receipt therefor, to the end that such warrants when paid and cancelled shall be properly filed in the office of the said County Clerk and Recorder.

Section 6. This resolution shall govern and apply to all special improvement district warrants issued and registered from and after the 12th day of August, 1916.

Passed by the Board of County Commissioners of Valley County, State of Montana, this 12th day of August, 1916.

RESOLUTION NO. 5

A RESOLUTION DIRECTING AND DECLARING THAT ALL THE COST AND EXPENSE OF MAKING IMPROVEMENTS IN HINSDALE SPECIAL WATER AND ELECTRIC LIGHT IMPROVEMENT DISTRICT NO. 1, OF VALLEY COUNTY, STATE OF MONTANA, SHALL BE ASSESSED AGAINST AND PAID BY THE ENTIRE DISTRICT, EACH LOT OR PARCEL OF LAND WITHIN SAID DISTRICT TO BE ASSESSED FOR THAT PART OF THE WHOLE COST WHICH ITS AREA BEARS TO THE AREA OF THE ENTIRE DISTRICT, EXCLUSIVE OF STREETS, ALLEYS AND PUBLIC PLACES; AND PROVIDING THAT SAID SPECIAL ASSESSMENT MAY BE PAID IN TWENTY EQUAL ANNUAL INSTALLMENTS EXTENDING OVER A PERIOD OF TWENTY YEARS; AND PROVIDING FOR THE ISSUANCE OF SPECIAL IMPROVEMENT DISTRICT WARRANTS IN PAYMENT OF SUCH COST AND EXPENSE.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF COUNTY COMMISSIONERS OF VALLEY COUNTY:

Section 1. That all the cost and expense of making the improvements provided for in resolution No. 1 adopted and approved on the 4th day of April, 1916, and Resolution No. 2 adopted and approved on the 6th day of June, 1916, creating Hinsdale Special Water and Electric Light Improvement District No. 1 for the purpose of constructing and installing a complete water system and an electric lighting system all in accordance with the plans and specifications of the County of Valley, State of Montana for such improvements, as fully described and set forth in said resolution; and providing that the cost of constructing such improvements shall be borne and paid by the entire district, to-wit:

EACH LOT OR PARCEL of land within such district to be assessed for that part of the whole cost which its area bears to the area of the entire district, exclusive of streets, alleys and public places.

Section 2. That all the cost and expense of making said improvements shall be paid by Hinsdale Special Water and Electric Light Improvement District No. 1 Fund. Such Warrants shall be of the denomination of two hundred and fifty (250) dollars, or multiple or fractional parts thereof.

Section 3. That said special assessment shall be paid in equal annual installments extending over a period of twenty (20) years beginning with the year 1917.
