POULTRY HINTS FOR SEPTEMBER (By R. L. Smith, Extension Poultry Specialist)

1. September Egg Production. September and October are months of low production. The old hens have stopped laying and are moulting. The pullets have not yet started. The heavy breeds seem to do better laying than Leghorns during these months.

2. Fattening the Chicks. Separate the surplus cockerels and give them a good fattening ration before sending to market or canning. A good fattening ration can be made as follows:

2 lbs. shorts
2 lbs. corn meal
1 lb barley
1 lb meat scrap

Mix with south milk or better still with butter-milk. Ask your local Farm Bureau office for detailed instructions for feeding and how to build a fattening crate.

3. Housing. See that the old poultry house is fixed for the winter. A few hours spent now before cold weather, in stopping all leaks in the roof and cracks in walls will assist in obtaining eggs when eggs are high. See your local Farm Bureau office for suggestions on a proper system of ventilation. One of the secrets of winter eggs is giving the hens plenty of fresh air, but avoid drafts and dampness. Dry cold air does not hurt hens as much as damp air. In a properly ventilated house you should not have any frost on the roof and walls. Be sure to give it a thorough cleaning and spray with a good disinfectant.


4. Bullets. Your farm bureau office can furnish you with more detailed information on any of the above subjects.

ORDINANCE NO. 265.

An ordinance determining the amount of city taxes on all property to be levied and assessed on the taxable property in the City of Glasgow for the current and fiscal year.

Be It Ordained by the City Council of the City of Glasgow, Montana; SECTION I. That the annual assessment and levy of the taxes in and for the City of Glasgow, Montana, for the current and fiscal year which begins on the First (1st) day of May, 1921 for the general, municipal and administrative purposes be and the same is hereby determined, fixed and levied at fourteen (14) mills on each dollar's worth of taxable property in the City, the same amount of money when collected and paid into the City Treasurer shall be apportioned and distributed as follows:

Two (2) mills for the general fund. Two (2) mills for the library fund. Two (2) mills for the park and cemetery fund.

SECTION II. That the money derived from the said library fund shall be placed in the library fund and shall be used exclusively for library purposes as provided for in Ordinance No. 42 of the City of Glasgow, Montana.

SECTION III. That for the purpose of maintaining and operating a park or cemetery department, a special assessment and tax of 2 mills be and the same is hereby allowed, fixed, assessed and levied on each dollar's worth of taxable property within the City of Glasgow, Montana.

SECTION IV. That the money derived from said park or cemetery levy shall be placed in the park or cemetery fund and shall be used exclusively for operating and maintaining a park or cemetery as provided for in Section 3345, Revised Codes of Montana, 1907.

SECTION V. That for the purpose of maintaining an operating the street department, a special assessment and tax of 2 mills be and the same is hereby allowed, fixed, assessed and levied on each dollar's worth of taxable property within the City of Glasgow, Montana.

SECTION VI. That the money derived from the said street levy shall be placed in the street fund and shall be used exclusively for maintaining streets and alleys as provided for in Section 3345, Revised Code of Montana, 1907.

SECTION VII. That for the purpose of maintaining and operating a fire department a special assessment and tax of 2 mills be and the same is hereby allowed, fixed, assessed and levied on each dollar's worth of taxable property within the City of Glasgow, Montana.

SECTION VIII. That the money derived from said fire levy shall be placed in the fire fund and shall be used exclusively for maintaining the fire hall and apparatus and anything pertaining to as provided in Section 3345, Revised Codes of Montana, 1907.

SECTION IX. That for the purpose of operating and maintaining a sewer department, a special assessment of 1 mill be and the same is hereby allowed, fixed, assessed and levied on each dollar's worth of property within the City of Glasgow, Montana.

SECTION X. That the money derived from said sewer levy shall be placed in the sewer fund and shall be used exclusively for maintaining and operating the sewer department of the City of Glasgow, Montana, as provided in Section 3345, Revised Codes of Montana, 1907.
