## MURRAY IS NOMINATED FOR STATE SENATOR

**Matt Murray of Glasgow Will Head Republican County Ticket at November Election.—Hall Gets Sheriff Nomination in Hotly Contested Three-Cornered Fight.—Riddick Leads Strong in Valley County.—Anderson Second, While Pray and Rankin Tie for Third Place.**

Matt Murray of Glasgow was nominated for state senator on the Republican ticket in Tuesday's primaries, John Etchart running a close second, with Peterson and Arnold taking third and fourth places in the race. Complete returns for the county were compiled and posted by the Courier at 9:00 o'clock Wednesday evening, and show that Chas. A. Hall has won the nomination for sheriff over Bert Seeley and James R. Stephens by a substantial plurality.

Congressman Carl W. Riddick was a strong first place candidate in Valley county, leading the entire field with a plurality of over four hundred. Burlingame of Great Falls was the favorite Republican candidate for Congress, the vote showing him to have a heavy plurality over the balance of the field of nine candidates. ## 8TH GRADE TO SOUTH SIDE

Lack of Room Large Enough in High School Building Necessitates a Change to South Side Building.

The Glasgow city schools will open on Tuesday, September 5. The courses offered will be the same as last year with the exception that woodworking and mechanical drawing will not be taught. This department has been omitted because of the necessity for economizing on expenditures. Glasgow is fortunate in that it has not been found necessary to eliminate any other departments to keep within the budget. Excellent courses in teacher training, college entrance and commercial work will be offered.

Miss Mary Hopkins, formerly supervisor of training in the Ft. Wayne, Ind., Normal school, will have charge of the teacher training work this year. Students from all of northeastern Montana should be attracted by the opportunity afforded to obtain this training near home.

## BANK ROBBERS CLEAN NORTH COUNTRY BANK

Five Masked Men Blow Up Farmers State Bank at Glentana Thursday Morning, Getting Away Clean With \$5,000 in Cash and Liberty Bonds.—Explosion Wrecks Entire Building.—All Wires into Town Cut.—Sheriff Half on Trail of Bandits.

Between three and four o'clock Thursday morning five masked men blew open the safe of the Farmers State bank at Glentana and escaped taking with them \$2,200.00 in cash and \$2,700.00 in Liberty bonds together with a grist of other valuable papers. J. J. Carroll, who resides in a small house next to the bank was awakened by the explosion, which not only demolished the safe, but partially destroyed the bank building. Carroll was unarmed and did not give the alarm until some time after the robbers had completed their work and departed. He stated that there were five men in the gang and heavily armed and masked. The robbers made their escape in a high powered car which had been parked in a pasture about a mile out of town. Before entering Glentana all telephone wires had been cut in several places and it was necessary to repair the lines before word could be telephoned into Glasgow. Immediately upon receipt of word at the sheriff's office here the alarm was sent out to all points in Montana and North Dakota as well as southern Saskatchewan and a posse was started out of Glentana to try and track the

## Riddick Nominated For United States Senator


Additional returns from all over the state up to noon Thursday slightly increased the lead of Representative Carl W. Riddick of Lewistown over Attorney General W. D. Rankin in the race for the republican nomination for the United States senate. Returns from precincts yet unreported will undoubtedly give Riddick a lead of several hundred.

One thousand and sixty-eight precincts show Riddick, 16,862; Rankin, 15,968.  
Reports of the count of Tuesday's primary are virtually complete from the larger counties. Reports from Blaine, Daniels, Jefferson, Pondera, Roosevelt and Sweet Grass counties are entirely lacking. These counties total 146 precincts.  
The remaining 316 precincts in the

state unheard from are, most of them, in Fergus, Chouteau, Dawson, Garfield and Carter counties, from which returns on only a small number of precincts has been reported.

## REMARKABLE PICTURE OF FATAL RAILROAD WRECK



Thirty-seven persons were killed and 137 others injured, twenty-five of them seriously, when passenger train No. 32 of the Missouri & Bonne Terre Railroad, a n all-steel train, crashed into the rear end of the fast Texas train No. 4 of the Missouri Pacific Railroad, on a high bridge near Sulphur Springs, Mo. The engineer in charge of the M. & B. T. train is said to have disregarded block signals. He was killed. Four of the wooden coaches were crushed to splinters and three others hurled off the bridge.

The loss to the bank is fully covered by insurance as to money loss, but the officers are unable to state just what the condition of the valuable papers were and what their loss might be on this account.  
Cashier H. O. Morgan was in Glasgow on the morning of the robbery, coming down to meet C. J. Lofgren, president of the bank, who arrived on the morning train.  
58,850 AUTOMOBILE LICENSES ARE SOLD DURING YEAR 1922  
Helena, Aug. 29.—Montana officials absolutely fail to agree on the number of automobiles in the state.  
Last year the 54 county assessors listed 41,575 cars. This year they have 49,346 on their rolls, as returned to the state board of equalization.  
However—  
Automobile licenses issued from the office of the secretary of state reached a total of 60,645 in 1920. At the end of 1921 the secretary of the state's office had 58,785 automobiles licensed. In the last week the license figures for 1922 showed 58,850 cars authorized to have ensoline bought of owners living in Montana.  
Montana automobiles depreciate rapidly, too, according to the county assessors' returns. Last year the 41,575 cars listed were given an average value of \$200.49. That made the total assessed valuation \$18,885,292. This year the average rate is estimated by the assessors at only \$290.43, which puts the total at \$15,155,051, unless a different rule is made by the state board of equalization after it resumes its sessions Wednesday.
