THE CHURCH CHOIR

Timely Hints to Ashland Choir Leaders On How to Train and Maintain One.

(By Henry G. Gilmore.)

When the members of a choral organization, in the best of temper, sent their skillful, but somewhat lethargic, leader, on the eve of his conducting "The Messiah," the short but incisive, missive, "Handel with care," they placed themselves on record as recognizing a qualification absolutely essential to the successful wielding of the baton.

Like good accompanists, inspiring directors are born, not made, which accounts readily enough for tangible results achieved by one individual as against another more highly gifted, but who, from a lack of this native leadership, grievously fails to meet expectations.

The quartet choir is essentially an American institution, born of that uncertainty which finds the singer located one day in Maine and, a few days later, perhaps in some town on our Pacific coast country.

To come now directly to the purpose of this article, viz., the "training and maintaining of at church choir," two conditions will have to be assumed in furnishing data illustrative of actual choir work.

Dealing briefly with this first condition, the wide-awake choirmaster sets out to secure resonant voices where time, tune and a good enunciation are positive factors to work upon, and the certainty that something more than a passing interest will be manifested by the singer in the drill necessary to a good performance.

The second condition assumed for the purpose of illustration is that of a boys' and men's choir of, say, forty voices. Boys' voices require different handling from those of women.

It is desirable that the positions of organist and choirmaster should be united in one and the same person and that smooth legato playing with the single purpose of fittingly sustaining and rounding of the music should characterize the performances of the gentleman on the organ bench.

Spokane, Wash.—Mining men from all parts of the country will make plans for building a mining temple in some city in the United States, when the American Mining Congress meets in annual session at Spokane, November 25 to 30. Secretary James F. Callbreath of the congress announced in Spokane that the governing board desired the matter of a temple decided at this year's session. The congress, he explained, proposes to make this temple the mining men's capitol building—a building costly and beautiful, and housing exhibits from mines the country over.

NEWSPAPER ADS. BEST.

"Go Into Every Home and Are Read By All," Says Prominent Banker.

In speaking before the members of the Mississippi Bankers' Association, R. L. Gurney, in charge of the savings department of the Commonwealth Trust Company of St. Louis, characterized the different devices and advertising plans sold to bankers of the United States as "lemons."

Some of these lemons are programs, dignified announcements of simply the bank's name, capital and location; special writeups and spasmodic instead of constant use of newspaper space, he said.

He outlined plans for writing bank advertisements and urged the bankers present to do this work themselves. He used a stereopticon to reproduce the newspaper advertisements used by the Commonwealth Trust Company and showed many which had brought in depositors to open savings accounts.

"The first step in taking up the advertising for your bank, and it is a step of paramount importance, is to decide to spend your appropriation in buying newspaper space only. You will find it difficult to adhere rigidly to this decision, but it will pay well to do so.

"Your bank is for all classes of people, and there is no way to so effectively present appeal for business to all classes as in the columns of the local newspaper. It not only reaches all classes, but goes into every home, where it is read by almost every member of the family. The daily newspaper is a controlling, likewise a compelling, factor in the daily life of every man and woman, and we ought really to say every boy and girl, for children are omnivorous readers nowadays.

"The shortest and most direct route to the attention of all the people is through the columns of the newspaper, for it is daily read by business men, professional men, merchants, artisans—all alike. Men and women, too, want their favorite newspaper the very minute it comes off the press, for they crave the news served up red hot. They also buy it to read the advertising columns."
