Alaska Anti-Alien Fish Bill Vetted.

Juneau, Alaska, May 2.—Just before the territorial legislature adjourned at an early hour today, Governor Walter E. Clark vetoed the anti-alien fish bill, directed at Japanese fishermen, which had been passed by both houses unanimously.

Leaders of both houses held at short conference with the governor and then announced that no attempt would be made to pass the bill over the governor's veto, and Japanese who are here in large numbers will continue their operations along the coast.

Governor Clark declined to comment on his action and refused to say whether he had followed instructions from Washington in vetoing the bill, but it is reported that a rapid interchange of messages between the territorial capital and Washington followed the passing of the bill.

The legislature, which is the first in the territory, has been in session since April 3.

WAS NO FROST DAMAGE

Smudge Pots Were Not Lighted During Recent Cold Spell at Talent—Watch Kept.

So far as can be learned there was no frost damage around Talent during the recent cold spell. The Sun-crest orchards had their smudge pots ready and Mr. Meader was on watch all night, but the thermometer did not go below 28. It is reported to have gone to 24 at points near Medford, but in the orchards where smudge pots were used there was no damage to the fruit.

JAPS REPORTED DRILLING.

Said to be Maintaining Military Organizations in California.

Sacramento, Cal., May 1.—Adjutant General A. E. Forbes of the California National Guard admitted today that he "had heard" that Japanese in the northern valleys of the state had during the last year been organizing militia companies, or at least associations whose activities embraced military drill.

"It was brought to my attention only recently that at Florin two Japanese companies were drilling from time to time, that another company had been formed in the Napa valley and other sections," said Adjutant General Forbes. "It was a little over a year ago that the Japanese generally in this section of the state began organizing associations whose interests and motives were maintained behind great secrecy. Ever since then information has been coming to this office of Japanese companies engaging in drill maneuvers."

The Japanese population of Florin and vicinity is considerably more than one thousand.
