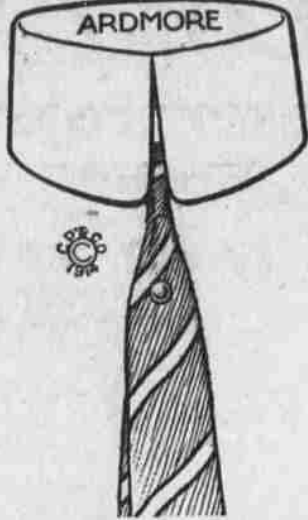

Municipal Plants May Be Enlarged

At council meeting Tuesday night Councilman Beaver brought up the question of bonds for an auxiliary electric light plant—including a new building and equipment about a mile down the canyon from the present plant and a reservoir on the top of Crownson hill.

Financial reports of the electric and water systems were read, following which Electrician Butterfield and Engineer Walker set forth their observations and conclusions on the subject of the proposed bonds. They suggest bonding the city for \$32,000 for the auxiliary electric light plant and \$10,000 for waterworks improvement.

The reservoir at the top of Crownson hill would insure an adequate water supply for years to come and would also provide the necessary reserve station for the water used at the auxiliary plant. The reservoir proposed would have a capacity of two million gallons and would cost \$20,000—half of this amount coming from the water department bonds and the other half from the light department bonds.

It is figured that the increase of service would very soon take care of the expenses, depreciation and interest, just as the present system is more than caring for itself. The demand for municipal service is constantly increasing and is already much more than the plant can take care of. Recorder Gillette reported that he is compelled to refuse requests for electricity for heating purposes every day because of inability to supply them.
