Mr. and Mrs. L. Weimer of Wolf Creek are spending a few days here on business.



Announcement has been received of the forty-fourth annual reunion of the Oregon Pioneer Association, which will be held in the Masonic Temple in Portland on Thursday, June 22. All persons coming to or born in the original territory of Oregon up to 1859, inclusive, without regard to where they now live, are eligible to membership in the association. The address of welcome will be delivered by Hon. H. R. Albee, mayor of Portland. A literary program will occupy the afternoon. The woman's auxiliary will hold a "hi-you much-anuck" at 4:30 p. m. and the annual business meeting in the evening will be followed by the annual "camp-fire." Reduced rates for pioneers have been announced on all railroads in the northwest.

New Road to River Is Open

Ashland fishermen will be glad to learn that the new county road recently built to the highbanks fishing grounds near the mouth of Bear creek on Rogue river is open for travel. This road opens up a direct way of getting to this favorite fishing and picnicking grounds.

By turning to the north on the road just across the Central Point bridge and keeping on the main road parties will be able to reach the highbanks in a half hour from Medford.
