The Battleship Alabama Compared With Philadelphia Bourse.

HAS AN IMMENSE DRAFT

Draws Over Thirty-two feet and Will Carry Six Hundred Men and Officers.

lar to all. No one would be tempted, standing on the pavement of the Bourse on looking up like a pigmy at its giant roof, to call it, as the embryo captain of the Alabama did, "a little beauty." The Bourse is about 190 feet high. The battleship is 86. The Bourse is 350 feet long and the battleship 270. The Bourse cost \$635,000 to build and the battleship \$1,500,000 exclusive of armament. The Bourse houses 400 men all day long and the battleship 600 men day and night. A thousand men completed the building in two years, but two thousand men have been working on the ship for two years and she is not yet done. In the Bourse there are one or two engines which are capable of doing all the work of the building, but in the battleship the engines are numbered by the fifties and the hundreds. All day long they grind away lighting the innermost parts of the ship, pumping fresh air into passages where fresh air would not otherwise go. Powerful engines drive this living busy hive from place to place wherever the honeyed conversation of Uncle Sam's booming war guns might be found necessary. Within a given space in the Alabama there is more going on than within a similar space in any office building in the world. Yet not once has there ever been a complaint that the situation was crowded. Down near the keel, thirty feet under the surface of the water, men are shoveling coal and running engines. Right above them another gang are storing away cans of powder or piling shot and shell away in the racks. Still further up, in another part of the ship away from the noise and whirl of the engines, men are sleeping and waiting their turn at watch. A city by itself where there is no distinction between night and day—that is what life on a battleship means. A never sleeping city run in the perfection of order and discipline where every man has his place and his appointed duties—that is what a battleship is. Colored waiters are to take the places of the undergraduate students of Yale, about thirty in number, who have been helping to pay their way through college by acting as waiters in the Yale commons. This is in accordance with a decision of the faculty which holds that such work interferes with study. The Lucha, published in Havana, says that in the event of Cuban independence the gravest problem to be faced will be the racial problem, and that the supremacy of the whites must be guaranteed. The paper admits, however, that "the negro, who are numerically the chief element in the population, starved and fought bravely during the war, while many bespangled cockalorum, now strutting around Havana in gorgeous uniforms, were in Mexico or Ucatan, lying about their political convictions."


