Three Oregon families were bitterly disappointed when they read the names of the 14 prisoners delivered up by Aguinaldo Saturday. Three men of the Second Oregon, Lawrence, Mills and McCoy, missing since April 29, and supposed to be in the hands of the insurgents, were not among those delivered up. Lawrence and Mills are from Marion county, while McCoy came from down the coast. It is possible they are with the Gilmore party, still held by the enemy.

Testimony in the long-drawn-out Ingalls-Olsen suit was finished yesterday afternoon but the arguments will not be made until the 31st day, by Judge McBride from Oregon City. It was proposed that the court and attorneys ride out to view the dam and alleged damages but owing to the bad roads and the fact that there is not enough water behind the dams, the trip was postponed until the 30th. The attorneys argued that if they went now the court would have to take along a supply of injunctions against the damns caused by the ruts and holes.

A fine buck deer was killed Sunday evening by the 13-year-old son of Joe Thomas on the Walluaki bridge. Young Thomas was out hunting with William Beasley and they both became separated. Mr. Beasley's hound soon was on the track of the deer which was met by Thomas when crossing the bridge. Young Thomas only had a 22 calibre rifle but the first shot penetrated the deer in the region of the heart and it went only a few yards when it fell. Mr. Beasley was soon upon the scene and dressed the deer. He brought several fine steaks back to Astoria which he distributed among his friends.

It is strongly rumored on the docks that the rate war has grown beyond the local stage and will affect the "Prisco steamer line. The steamer Aberdeen came in yesterday and received orders to go to the railroad dock if she had freight but she had none and docked at Fisher's. It is said that in connection with another steamer, already selected, the Aberdeen will form an opposition line with the railroad people as agents. This is important, if true, and does not promise a speedy end of the rate contest. This new phase, however, Astoria can bear comfortably, but it will be a fly in the amber for Portland. The Aberdeen went up to Portland to load. Her first cargo will be principally lumber.
