FILIPINO ENVOY WILL HAVE NO OFFICIAL RECOGNITION

State Department Will Not Receive Him In Any Manner.

MUST EMPLOY HIRED ATTORNEYS

If He Gets a Hearing Before the Philippine Commissioners It Will Be by Their Personal Tolerance.

NEW YORK, Oct. 27.—A special to the World from Washington says: Secretary of State Hay, when asked if Senor Regidor, the Filipino envoy, would be permitted to appear before the Philippine commission, said:

"I have heard that he contemplated visiting the United States and would present some such plan as that outlined by the newspapers. He would have no official or diplomatic recognition in Washington, either as the agent of the Filipino insurgents or as a diplomatic representative of the so-called Filipino government. The question of his being heard by the Philippine peace commission rests entirely with the commission itself. The state department is not concerned in the matter in any way."

From a confidential source it is learned that Senor Regidor will employ as his legal representatives a well-known firm of Washington lawyers who have had much experience in international problems.

The basis of the demand of the Filipinos for the establishment of an independent government will be contained in a memorial to be filed with the commission as coming from a number of the leading residents of several of the larger islands of the Philippine archipelago, representing various races and not by any means confined to the Filipinos.

This memorial will recite that the Filipino government which was estab-

lished June 15, 1898, was directly inspired by the example of the United States; that at the time of the adoption of the so-called government, the natives, who were in a majority and by every right should govern the islands, found themselves superior in position as to their control of their country to that of the Americans when the American declaration of independence was framed. The memorial will plead that this country should not repudiate an example based on its own experience in relating conditions similar to those which the United States contested a century ago.

The Filipino envoy, Senor Regidor, it is understood, will not confine himself to diplomatic representations. It is refused an official status he will immediately start a newspaper propaganda much after the fashion of that instituted by the Cuban junta during the early years of their war.

He will endeavor to have literature to the Filipinos published in the Congressional Record, which will be distributed throughout the country, and in this manner arouse sympathy for his people.

Senator Hoar and others of equal note can be depended upon to assist in this crusade. Members of the house will also be willing to champion the cause of the Filipinos.

The withdrawal of Speaker Reed is regarded as of material assistance to their cause, for the reason that, while

personally favoring the independence of the Filipinos, he was so great a party man that he refused to permit a discussion of the question in the house.

MAY WEAR SEALSKINS.

Visitor from Canada and Elsewhere May Bring Their Garments With Them.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 27.—Assistant Secretary Spaulding has issued a circular of instructions to collectors of customs amending the former rulings of the department so as to permit the entry without detention, under the act of December 29, 1897, of sealskin garments worn by persons temporarily visiting the United States from Canada.

Under the new ruling, persons arriving from Canada with furskin garments who declare their intention of returning within 90 days will be required to execute an affidavit to that effect before a United States consul.

Under the act of 1897, the importation of sealskin garments is prohibited unless accompanied by an invoice certified by a United States consul to the effect that the skins were not taken from seals in prohibited waters.

It is said that the strict enforcement of these regulations has resulted in great annoyance to Canadians coming across the border to attend social functions and intending to return the same way, as well as to the traveling public generally; hence the modification.

PULLMAN-WAGNER COMPANY.

Name of the Old Company to be Changed Under the Consolidation.

CHICAGO, Oct. 27.—The Chronicle says:

Control of the Pullman Palace Car Company will pass out of the hands of the Vanderbilts December 5. On that day the Pullman stockholders will meet and approve the agreement of purchase of the Wagner company's assets and contracts, recently ratified by the directors. At this meeting the question of changing the name of the Pullman company will also be considered.

It is understood that the larger corporation will be known as the Pullman-Wagner Palace Car Company.

SCHLEY TO HAVE A HOME.


Patriotic Women Propose to Raise the Funds to Buy Him a Washington House.

PHOENIX, Ariz., Oct. 27.—Acting Governor Akers has received a telegram Naco saying that everything is quiet on the international line after the cowboy-Mexican battle of Sunday, and will probably so continue unless the Mexican authorities attempt to remove the prisoners now in jail at Naco, Mexico, to some other place for trial, in which event another battle is inevitable. A troop of 40 American soldiers pitched camp near Naco today. Acting Governor Akers has wired Secretary of State Hay at Washington for further instructions.
