Susan Mattson yesterday filed a suit for damages against the city of Astoria to recover \$2000 claimed to be due her through injuries sustained by Henry Mattson, of whom the plaintiff is the guardian, by falling through the west end of Bond street to the beach below, a distance of 35 feet. The complaint states that the youth was badly damaged, that besides breaking his jaw, losing his teeth and suffering other temporary injuries, he is permanently lame. The immediate cost of medicine was \$125, and the plaintiff claims that \$2000 and costs will cover all expense and answer for all damages.

There was a lively time when the republican clubs met at Portland a little less than two years ago. Factional politics and the senatorial contest had engendered much bitterness, and only the hardest kind of work by wiser heads prevented the meeting from becoming worse than a howling farce.

A call for the biennial convention to meet in February at Portland has been issued. It will be a more harmonious gathering than that which preceded the Astoria republican state convention. The call reads:

In pursuance of the provisions of the constitution of the Republican League of Oregon, there will be held the regular biennial meeting on the first Tuesday of February next, and a certain amount of preparatory work must be done by each club in order to entitle it to be represented at the meeting.

Your attention is invited to article 19 of the constitution, which is an amendment thereto, adopted February 1, 1898, and provides that no club shall be entitled to representation unless it has been organized at least four months prior to the meeting, and shall have filed a list of its members with the league secretary at least 30 days prior thereto.

The importance of the double campaign next year, one in the spring and the national one in the fall, renders it especially desirable that every genuine republican club in the state be put into condition to participate in the league meeting, and thus enter with enthusiasm into the work of the campaign.
