NO NEW DEVELOPMENTS.

A revolver and knew nothing about his brother except that he was in the room when his father first arrived. He knew nothing about his brother getting a pistol or bringing it back to the room, or anything that occurred until they brought his father up stairs later. Then he went down stairs and slept and cried the remainder of the night. The reason he cried, he explained upon the interrogation of Attorney Fulton, was that he was afraid his father would come up and whip him; he always did so when he came home drunk, and he came home drunk about twice a week. He knew that his brother had a pistol last Christmas but he did not know where he kept it and had not seen it since.

Coroner Pohl telephoned Mrs. Jarvi's physician and he replied that Mrs. Jarvi was not able to leave the house, but the jury might go to her house and take her testimony. But as the room was reported very small it was decided to postpone taking her evidence and that of Officer Thompson until a later date. Coroner Pohl may go and take Mrs. Jarvi's evidence in writing and then read it to the jury. The jury will go in a body and examine the premises before it renders its verdict.

There is no evidence of the actual killing scene before the jury. The fact that it is told on the streets that Mat Jarvi confessed to the crime is the only knowledge on the subject. He cannot be compelled to go on the stand and the statement he made at the time he gave himself up may not be admitted against him. The case may have to be eventually tried strictly on circumstantial evidence and it may be difficult to get any direct evidence against Mat Jarvi. Those who were nearest and heard everything but the shooting and the part Mat Jarvi took in the matter have given no evidence against him and know nothing when interrogated on this point, and the state may yet have great difficulty in making out a case which was thought at first to be clearly settled. Mrs. Jarvi's evidence will be awaited with interest, as she is the only witness left that ought to know about the actual circumstances of the killing.

The funeral of the murdered man has not been arranged, but it is now reported that the county will have to bury his remains.

GREAT NORTHERN LANDSLIDE.

CALL FOR PRIMARIES.

CALL FOR CONVENTION.

Notice is hereby given that there will be held in the City of Astoria at Fisher's opera house on Friday, March 28, at the hour of 10 o'clock a. m., a Republican county convention, for the purpose of nominating candidates for the various county offices, as follows:

One state senator, two representatives, county judge, one commissioner, clerk, sheriff, treasurer, assessor, surveyor, school superintendent, coroner, justice of the peace, constable, road supervisor.

The apportionment of delegates is based on the vote cast for Malcolm A. Moody for congress, in 1900, allowing one delegate for each 20 votes cast in each precinct, one for each fraction over 20 votes and one delegate at large, entitling the city precinct to 22 delegates from the first ward, 16 delegates from the second ward, 10 delegates from the third ward. The country precincts are entitled to the following delegates: Olney, 2; John Day, 2; Svensen, 2; Walluska, 2; New Astoria, 4; Warrenton, 3; Clatsop, 3; Seaside, 5; Westport, 3; Clifton, 4; Knappa, 3; Melville, 2; Chadwell, 3; Elsie, 2; Push, 2; Youngs River, 2; Mishawaka, 2; Vesper, 2; and Jewell, 2.

It is recommended by the chairman of the county central committee that no proxy be accepted at the convention unless it be held by a resident of the precinct in which the delegate is using the proxy resides.

Additional Local.

The retail clerks will hold their regular meeting this evening at the city hall, at 7:30 o'clock.

A new engine for the Clatsop Mill Box Company factory arrived yesterday from the East.

Wm. Davis was in the city from John Day yesterday and denied the report that his son's child was ill with smallpox.

The case of A. Goldstein vs. M. Susman, charging the defendant with assault and battery, was dismissed from Judge Goodman's docket yesterday on the failure of the plaintiff to appear and prosecute his case.

Annie, the 7-year-old daughter of Mrs. Peter Nuter, died of meningitis on Sunday morning. The funeral will be held from the residence at 1:30 today. The steamer Callender will start from Booth's cannery. Interment at Greenwood.

John Richards, the hobo pedestrian, had a hearing before Judge Nelson yesterday afternoon. Upon being called upon for an explanation of what he came to Astoria for, Richards said he was hunting a mining camp. After hearing his story and siding him up the judge informed him that there were no mining camps in this section; that all of the digging that was done here was for claims; that the people of Astoria would not permit begging; people here worked for a living and there was plenty of work. He wound up by fining Richards \$50, but he made a proviso and that was that he would leave town instantly or pay the fine. Richards preferred to leave town and Chief Hallock said that he left. He started him east with the injunction that he should not return.

The tax rolls in the sheriff's office showed collections at closing time last Saturday evening to the amount of \$97,678.59. The three per cent rebate which shows up on the records in the sum of \$2965.26, added to this, satisfies the roll in the sum of \$100,643.85. Taxpayers still have until the first Monday in April, which is April 7, to pay taxes without having to pay any penalty. If half of the amount due is paid by that date there will be no penalty charged until after the first Monday in October, when a penalty of 10 per cent will be added to all taxes due. The three per cent privileges was extended to all persons who paid half of their taxes prior to last Saturday but as a remarkable fact only 31 out of 374 taxpayers only paid half of their taxes. All the remainder paid the full amounts due.
