Only five marriage licenses had been issued up to last night for this month, but this is two more than were issued for the same time last year.

The Astorian is in receipt of sample copies of the "Romadospasten," a large and neat newspaper, but there is no one on the force able to read it.

M. A. Rolfs, representing Strauss Bros., Chicago, America's leading tailors, will be at C. H. Cooper's next Friday and Saturday, April 18th and 19th.

Stella, Washington, has now been selected as the place of headquarters of the logging interests at the mouth of the Columbia which was formerly at Westport.

Master Fish Warden Van Dusen was kept busy again yesterday issuing license to fishermen. The prospects are that a large number will engage in the work this season.

Only three men are now in the county jail, the two men charged with stealing logs and the Chinaman, Yo Sup, who tried to leave the country without paying his debts.

A number of fishermen went out yesterday, but the catch was small—in fact, did not justify the operation of the canneries. This does not dampen the ardor of the fishermen, however, as another day may bring success.

The price of fish between the fishermen and cannerymen has been amicably fixed at 5 cents a pound for Chinooks of 35-pounds or under, and 6 cents a pound for those over that weight.

H. M. Lorntsen has been selected as a delegate to the state federation of labor meeting, which takes place in Portland the first Monday in May, by the Columbia River Fishermen's Protective Union.

The plumbers met last night and prepared to organize a union. They expect to receive their charter within the next two or three weeks at which time they will perfect organization.

Mayor Suprenant is reported as authority for the statement that Sixteenth and Astor from Sixth to the erome avenue; Franklin between Eighteenth and Astor from Sixth to the old Washington cannery, will be improved at an early day.

The exodus of a large number of fishermen to Alaska recently, it was thought, would make dull times in Astoria, but it is not the case. More have filled their places and business rushes just the same.

The merits of advertising are illustrated every day. The Astorian mentioned the fact that Billie Binder had lost a pig. The pig was found and returned to the owner, and he contemplates a pig dinner next Sunday.

The Astoria Electric Company is branching out in the way of improvements. It is soon to have a new power building and will add a large boiler, engine and power generator. The car line is also being extended at a rapid rate.

John Alexander Dowle, the Chicago "Zionist," is playing in good luck. Not many moons ago he won out as defendant in a suit involving a large money transaction and now an admirer of his in New Zealand has passed in his chips and left the "Zionist" leader a handsome legacy of \$50,000.

Benches have now been added to the Republican campaign headquarters and the seating capacity is largely increased. No appointments for speaking have been made yet. Secretary Curtis said yesterday that as soon as opposition was put up that there might be something to fight the campaign would open.

Speaking of the trials of pilots, one of the pilots said last night that last Fourth of July a pilot was out all day watching for a tramp steamer from China and missed the celebration on that account, when the steamer he was watching for decorated in our national colors at Hong Kong.

Complaint is made to the Astorian that none of the drug stores are open late at night and that no night clerks are where they can be found. It is claimed that a few nights ago a child was very sick and that a physician said it was no use to prescribe as none of the drug stores were open.

Mrs. F. O. Walters, whose husband died recently in Pasadena, Cal., arrived home on the Columbia yesterday. Mrs. Walters is much worn with the long vigil at the bedside of her husband, but is otherwise in good health. Mr. Walters suffered much during his sickness, but the end came in peace. The body was cremated at Pasadena.

Mrs. Fredricka Nelson, a noted evangelist, who has traveled extensively in Norway, Sweden, Denmark and the United States, will speak in the Norwegian and Danish Methodist church on Tuesday evening, April 15 at 8. Also Wednesday, Thursday and Friday nights and on Sunday, April 20, morning and evening. All Scandinavians invited.

On Thursday, April 17, the Woman's Relief Corps will serve a merchants lunch at 12 o'clock in the storeroom next the Astorian office. It is evident that the Southerners are blocking the passage of the Chinese exclusion bill through a spirit of revenge. The gratifying news from the national capital that the states of Washington and Idaho will co-operate with Oregon, in an effort to have the senate amendment to the river and harbor bill providing for The Dalles canal to be retained in the bill is an apt illustration that the states of the great Northwest stand hand in hand, on all matters of public interest.

The regular meeting of the Retail Clerks' Union was largely attended last evening at the city council chamber rooms. Besides the routine business it was decided to hold a social session in about two weeks at Page's hall at which the merchants will be invited. Two delegates were also elected to attend the state federation of labor convention, which meets in Portland the first Monday in May. Charles McEwan and Ed. Struemyer were elected delegates.

The meeting at the Chadwell school house, Monday afternoon, was largely attended by Lewis and Clark people. The committee on timber cutting reported that a mill had been set up and logs hauled thereto. The members of the committee resigned and C. S. Dow, E. F. Libbe and J. N. Heckard appointed as successors. The mill is in active operation and will be run until a sufficient supply for road purposes is effected.

The last games in the bowling contest between the Commercial and Irving Clubs will take place tomorrow night at the "Young club alleys." The games had been postponed on account of the absence from the city of some of the bowlers. There is now talk of another state tournament, to be made up of the following clubs: Astoria Commercial Irving Multnomah Portland Commercial, Hillside, of Salem, and The Dalles Commercial. The "Big Four" trophy, which is again in the possession of the bowling association, is to be offered as a prize.

In the case of Paul Schroder vs. Jas. W. Hare, sheriff, in the circuit court yesterday, a decree for plaintiff was entered and an order issued to the clerk to summon a jury for the June term. A suit for divorce by Sarah A. Grimes vs. C. C. Grimes and G. M. Grimes, in which property rights are involved, also occupied the attention of the court. Cases for the June term were set as follows: John L. Bock vs. City of Astoria, for alleged injuries to the amount of \$5100 by falling through a hole on Duane street; W. A. Dees vs. City of Astoria, to recover damages in the sum of \$2075 for injuries to a 5-year-old son of the plaintiff, by falling through a hole on Commercial street; Dean Bros. Steam Pump Works, vs. Astoria Iron Works; John Reid vs. J. J. Kenney and Paddy Lynch; Ross & Sprague Company vs. Yaku Packing Company. Jury trials will be the order in all these cases.

THE CITIZENS' MOVE. Say They Will Not Endorse County Legislative Ticket.

The citizens' convention called for today to meet at the court house, at 1 o'clock, will not meet at the court house as the court is in session, but will meet at the city hall, instead, at the same hour.

A prominent citizen who is one of the inside of the move, gave the Astorian an outline of the work last night. He said that the statement that the citizens' convention would endorse the county Republican legislative ticket was all bosh; that the main fight would be made on this ticket. While he would not state the fact, yet it is claimed that the Democrats have a hope of winning the legislative ticket in order to figure in the election of a United States senator. It is claimed that in case the Democratic legislative ticket is elected from this county, which will be under the name of "Citizens' ticket," that they will endeavor to elect a Democratic United States senator, but that if this cannot be done they will come over to Hon. C. W. Fulton, in case he is a candidate.

The outline of the ticket today is W. J. Cook, present police commissioner, for the state senate, and V. M. Lorntsen, who is secretary of the Columbia River Fishermen's Union, and G. O. Moen, who is also a police commissioner for the lower house.

They say that John Hahn will be nominated for county judge; J. H. Hansen for sheriff, and Mr. West, of Skipanon, will be nominated for commissioner. No one is settled upon for assessor and treasurer, but it is probable that Astbury, the Republican nominee for county surveyor, will be endorsed for surveyor by the citizens' convention. They say there is no doubt but that the citizens' convention will endorse J. C. Clinton for county clerk, and Mr. Pohl for coroner, both of whom are nominees of the Republican party.

In spite of the hopeless appearance of success to the citizens' move they claim that they are serious and have no reason to doubt electing a part of their ticket.
