But as the local paper has taken it up and mixed things generally it may be well to reproduce the item which appeared in the Astorian and which has caused so much comment. There was not one word in the item in reference to South Carolina, but some local citizen, who doubtless hails from that state, took umbrage at the article and forwarded it to his home paper, with a biographical sketch of the editor of the Astorian.

There is as much intelligence, honesty, industry, thrift, go-ahead-activeness there according to the white population as any place in the world. The New South is different from the Old South. Northern enterprise has assisted in the development of the New South. Hoicet Southerners know this. The world knows it. It is not news to state it. The unfortunate victim of the assault by the South Carolina editor and the hard blows of the esteemed local contemporary, has made many enemies defending the South in the North, and is probably too much prejudiced yet in favor of the South to see its conditions in an unfavorable light, and what was written about "getting out of the rut," and which is reproduced here, was written without intention of reflection but in the line of selling the truth for the purpose of drawing an illustration which followed the article.

"Poking fun" at the editor personally, because he came from the "backwoods" does not alter the facts. One from the "backwoods" may occasionally be able to tell the truth and such solemn truth as to stir up the people far away from home. And he might get out of the rut set by the wise metropolitan newspaper men sufficiently to have his home town read about outside of the precinct in which the paper is published.

Following is the article that has brought the Astorian and this section of the country into such notoriety: "For 30 years after the civil war the people of the South remained in the same rut. They worked in the same manner, raised cotton and corn, plowed and hoed with the same kind of crude implements, built the same kind of houses, kept the same kind of stores, sold the same kind of goods, voted the same ticket and fought in the same old way, and entertained the same kind of feuds. From father to son, and to grandson they followed in the same footsteps and possessed the same ambitions.

"An innovation on their work, anything that tended to get out of the regular rut seemed like foolhardiness to them. They raised cotton and corn and bought their meat and wearing apparel from the North. The Northern people began to investigate the country. They found that there were openings there for the Northerner. The Northerner went there and raised hogs, and wheat, and fine blooded stock, and established cotton mills and factories. The Southern people were startled; they thought the new comers were fools—the idea of getting out of the rut!"
