COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS.

Regular Fortnightly Meeting of the City Fathers.

At the meeting of the city council held last evening the following business was transacted:

Petition of Carlson Bros. for a retail liquor license referred to committee on health and police.

A remonstrance from property holders on Irving avenue requesting that the present grade on that avenue between Thirty-fifth and Thirty-ninth streets be not changed was referred to the street committee.

A remonstrance signed by the principal property owners interested in the improvement of Exchange street between Fourteenth and Seventeenth streets strongly opposed the use of plank in such improvement, holding that rock would be much more advisable as being permanent and making a better street. They also object to such improvement being attempted in the winter, for obvious reasons, and asking that the improvement be deferred until spring. The remonstrance was referred to the street committee.

The owners of blocks 18 and 37 in Adair's Astoria presented a remonstrance against those blocks being included in the assessment to pay for a drain on Thirty-fourth street, such drain being built to prevent slides anticipated on account of the grading of said street.

Accommodation from the county court requested that the city assume charge of the roads leading out of the city connecting with the Nehalem and the Pike line roads, and keep same in repair with funds collected by road Supervisor C. E. Foster.

A communication from the city treasurer calling attention to the inadequate remuneration of his office, considering the large amount of work made necessary by numerous street improvements, etc., was referred to committee on ways and means.

Liquor licenses were granted to E. D. Sigerstrom of the World's Fair saloon; DeGaire and Brooks, of the Parker House bar, and Lars Larson, of Foster's Exchange.

The board of equalization filed a report confirming the assessment for the improvement of Commercial street between Sixth and Third. The assessments made are payable on October 20. The improvement was duly accepted from the contractor, W. E. Goodwin, and the amount of the contract, \$2,057, ordered paid.

An ordinance providing for the improvement of Third street between Commercial and Duane was referred back to the committee.

Ordinances were passed establishing the grades of Forty-ninth street in Alderbrook, from Birch to Cedar streets, and the grade of Cedar street. An emergency was declared to exist and the improvement of a portion of the road around Smith's Point was ordered proceeded with by the proper committee, the expense not to be above \$300, and the road to be completed by November 1.

The report of the city surveyor on a suitable grade for Duane street from Second to the west line of the Hinman tract was adopted.

The report of the street committee on the acceptance of the Astor street improvement was laid on the table until signed by street superintendent.

After considerable discussion as to the advisability of renewing the plank on the Exchange street roadway between Seventeenth and Twenty-third streets favorable action was taken looking to its improvement.

The committee on streets reported adversely on claim of the water commissioner for \$200 for improvements on the tide line road.

Favorable action was taken on application of Geo. W. Hume for the vacation of a small portion of a street adjacent to the new sawmill.

Resolutions were passed providing for extensive systems of wooden drains on Thirty-fourth and Thirty-eighth

streets, for the improvement of Cedar street and an alleyway in Alderbrook. The most interesting thing about the meeting, and perhaps the one least appreciated by the average citizen is the amount of time and painstaking labor devoted by the city fathers for the good of the public, and with no compensation.

It is very evident that the gentlemen endeavor conscientiously to conserve the interests of the city and to avoid working a hardship on any individual in so doing. They certainly deserve the respect and gratitude of every inhabitant of the city.

THE FRUIT CROP.

The apple crop last season produced eight hundred and fifty thousand boxes of fresh and one hundred and fifty thousand pounds of dried fruit. The crop this year will be considerably larger, though the price realized will be less, owing to the large Eastern crop. Owners of the large commercial orchards who ship their apples to England will realize as much as they did last year, but not so with the small producers.

The state raised 240,000 boxes of peaches in 1901 and dried 415,000 worth. This year in the Ashland district, which produces the bulk of the crop, the increase will be fully twenty per cent.

Estimates differ as to the pear crop. Last year Oregon produced one hundred thousand boxes, and the output of dried pears brought \$10,000. The crop may not be quite as large this year, but the shortage will not be great.—Tradesman.

THE NEW ENGLISH STAMPS.

Now that the king of England has been crowned that government is preparing to issue a new series of postage stamps showing him wearing his crown in place of the wreath represented on the present ones. It is generally admitted that now is the proper time to make the change as it was considered inappropriate to represent him wearing his crown before the coronation had actually taken place.
