

### Susman Will Make Appeal

#### Refuses to Pay Fine Imposed in Justice's Court--Drove an Old Crippled Horse.

What gave promise at first of a brief giving of testimony, a swift conviction and the imposing of a fine, developed yesterday in a long drawn out trial that occupied the attention of the Justice's court from 10 a. m. until 4:30 o'clock in the afternoon. And the end is not yet, for the dissatisfied defendant vows that he will make appeal. In such event, the State vs. Marcus Susman will appear upon the dockets of the circuit court.

Mr. Susman was arrested a few days ago, the charge being cruelty to an animal. The alleged cruelty rested in the fact that Mr. Susman had been driving about the streets a horse that gave every appearance of being utterly unfit for work. He is old and seemingly crippled in every joint, and when being driven staggers along as if each step would surely be his last. So when Mayor Suprenant filed complaint against Susman, none expressed surprise. At the outset the defendant determined to fight the case and retained A. M. Smith to his defense. The case was called at 10 a. m. and with the exception of a brief respite at noon, continued until late in the afternoon.

Besides the taking of testimony of several witnesses, the horse was led up to the door of the court room in the afternoon and was critically inspected by the jury. The animal looked a fit subject for a glue factory, but never a draft horse; so the jury was not slow in bringing in a verdict of guilty as charged, when the case was finally turned over to them. The court imposed a fine of \$25 and costs, which sum was not collected, the defendant preferring to make appeal. It is possible, however, that this plan may be abandoned, as Susman's friends are trying to make it clear to him that it would be better for him if he would pay up and be good.

Superintendent of Schools H. S.
