RATHER COLD

Mercury Goes as Low as 50 Below Zero in the East.

Colder Than at Any Time in the Past Fifteen Years—New York Suffers.

Rutland, Vt., Jan. 5.—Thermometers registered from 40 to 45 below today.

Coldest in Years.

Philadelphia, Jan. 5.—New Jersey, Pennsylvania, and Delaware experienced the coldest weather in years today. In the mountain regions the mercury went as low as 35 below zero.

Forty Below in New York.

New York, Jan. 5.—Record breaking cold occurred today. At some points thermometers registered 20 to 30 below. In northern New York it has been less than 12 below and has gone as low as 40 below during the last four days. In central and western New York the average temperature is 30 below.

Fifty Below Zero.

Utica, N. Y., Jan. 5.—At several points north of here the mercury went to 50 below.

Rather Chilly in Ohio.

Cleveland, Jan. 5.—Many points in Ohio report temperatures from four to 20 below.

Blocked By Ice.

Boston, Jan. 5.—The coldest weather in 15 years occurred today. In some places the mercury fell to 45 degrees below zero. At Orange, Mass., thermometers burst at 50 below. Both passages of the Narraganset bay are closed by ice.

REGIMENTS INCITE TROUBLE

New York, Jan. 5.—Repressive measures are being accepted by the government, says a Herald dispatch from Montevideo, Uruguay, to put down the revolutionary movement just started by the so-called nationalist party. The ostensible cause of the movement is

the presence of two regiments of cavalry in the department of Rivera which the government sent there during the conflict between Uruguay and Brazilians along the boundary line.

The nationalists who have a majority in that department say there is no necessity for the troops to remain longer but the true cause seems to be the decision of the government to break down the influence of Saravia, a petty local chief, who enjoys great popularity and influence in Rivera. The movement up to the present has been without importance though there has already several collisions.

Movements at Colon.

Colon, Jan. 5.—The gunboat Topeka and the torpedo boat destroyers Dale and Stewart arrived here today. The Dixie is now alongside the dock disembarking stores and provisions preparatory to landing marines which will probably take place tomorrow.

ONE INDICTMENT AGAINST DIETRICH IS QUASHED.

The Other Stands, However, and the Senator Will Be Tried on Charge of Bribery.

Omaha, Jan. 4.—A legal battle preceded the trial in the federal court of United States Senator Charles H. Dietrich, charged with conspiracy with Neb., and of violation of the statute against bribery. The counsel for Dietrich scored the first victory. This point was on the demurrer, attacking the indictments in the point of sufficiency and alleging it would have the effect of placing the senator on trial twice on the same charge. Judge Vandevanter announced for the court that the demurrer was sustained. This ruling quashes the indictment against Senator Dietrich, charging conspiracy. On this indictment the government had prepared itself for trial and to testify in which large number of witnesses were present in the city.

Aside from the indictment charging the senator with profiting by leasing a building to the United States government while a member of congress, still remains the indictment charging him with bribery in connection with the appointment of the postmaster at Hastings.

HOLLY ROLLERS ROLLED IN TAR AND FEATHERS

Freak Religionists Ordered From Corvallis—"Apostle" Takes Lady With Him.

Corvallis, Ore., Jan. 5.—Joshua Creffield and Charles Brooks, the Holy Rollers, who have made the name of Corvallis famous from the Pacific to the Atlantic, last night met the fate which they long had been promised. Tar and feathers in unlimited quantities and without consideration as to expense were administered to the two contortionists, and with the "dressing" went an order for the apostles to never again return to the peaceful little city in the valley. A double climax was reached this morning when Creffield, still bearing the obnoxious covering, at least in spots, took Miss Maud Hurt to Albany and married her there before anyone had time to interfere. Corvallis is rejoicing over the proceedings of last night, and the citizens are congratulating themselves upon having accomplished a good job.

About 10 o'clock last night 20 determined and fearless citizens went across the river into Linn county and took Creffield and Brooks unaware at the Beach cottage, where they have been staying since ousted from the Hurt home. The apostles were brought to Corvallis and taken to the southern

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part of the city, and there, out in the cold, damp air of the mid-winter night and under the bare canopy of the heavens, stripped, tarred and feathered in the style adopted ages ago. The men could offer no resistance, in view of the overwhelming majority, and accepted their penalty with all possible grace.

When properly tarred and feathered the men were turned loose, and told that if they ever returned to this town or vicinity their doom would be quickly sealed by hanging to the nearest tree. With this admonition the apostles departed and the mob dispersed.

At midnight friends of the victims of the surprise party awakened Henry Wortham, a druggist, and procured turpentine and oils for the purpose of removing the sticky coats. That the victims worked hard all night is evident from the fact that shortly after dawn this morning Creffield and Miss Hurt secured a buggy and drove to Albany, a distance of 12 miles, and there were made husband and wife, at 9 o'clock.

O. V. Hurt, father of the girl who had become infatuated with the smooth expounder of the principles of his original doctrine, this morning stated that that he had no previous knowledge of the intended marriage, but thinks that the plans were formulated during the night when it became certain to Creffield that he would no longer be endured by the people of this community. "The wedding," Mr. Hurt said, "took place without my knowledge or consent, but as both parties are of age, I could not have stopped it."

History of the Holy Rollers.

The Holy Rollers organized over a year ago, but not until about four months ago did their tenets become objectionable to the community. At the time the cottage of O. V. Hurt was turned into a prayer-house upon the suggestion of Apostle Creffield, and nightly seances that proved revolting to the public were indulged in. Household effects were sacrificed upon altars of fire, and the members of the sect turned all their attention from worldly affairs, devoting their time to rolling and praying. Mr. Hurt, who, up to that time had been a highly respected citizen, and business man, was seized with the craze and quit a good position to devote his time to the sect. Several women prominent in social circles joined the Creffield gang, and more than one home was threatened with destruction. The matter was laid before the courts, but nothing could be done, as the leaders demonstrated clearly that they were not insane, although one girl member of the rollers has since developed into a maniac.

Mr. Hurt was finally persuaded to drive the apostles from his house, and he returned to his old position. The wedding of Miss Hurt to the man who aroused all of Corvallis against her family is not considered in the light of an unexpected sequel to the sensational affair.
