ARRANGE FLANK MOVEMENT.

Japanese Troops Plan Action of Great Importance.

St. Petersburg, April 20.—What may turn out to be an anticipated flanking movement of Japanese troops is the appearance of a number of Japanese ships of Polina, near the Gulf of Chinkai-Tse, as reported to the emperor today by General Kuropatkin. Military experts here have long regarded that vicinity as a probable point of disembarkation of the second Japanese expedition.

Though the Japanese are building entrenchments on the Yalu it is believed they will advance soon. Arrange-

ments for the turning movement are complete and experts say that such a move could properly begin at Takushan as Fenghuan Cheng lies at the angle of a triangle, with Takushan and the mouth of the Yalu at angles at the base of the triangle.

The Japanese disembarkation will undoubtedly be covered by warships and Russians recognize that it would be impossible to prevent it.

"We will strike after they have landed," grimly said a member of the general staff.

General Kuropatkin is aware of the strategic importance of the vicinity of Tausan and it is understood that he has made arrangements accordingly.

SIBERIAN RAILWAY FIT FOR SERVICE DESPITE REPORTS

Missionary Reports That Line Is in Perfect Condition for Transportation of Troops.

Victoria, B. C., April 20.—According to the statement of the Rev. George Douglas, late head of the Wesleyan Manchurian mission at Liao Yang, the reports that the great Siberian railway is not fit for service are utterly without foundation. Since early in March from seven to twelve trains loaded with troops and equipment have passed over the line daily without accident. Thirty thousand of Russia's choicest troops are in barracks at Liao Yang under General Linievitch, chief of staff. Enormously strong fortifications have been thrown up on the west side of the Yalu river and a vast scheme of entrenchments and earthworks was to be undertaken as soon as the cold weather passed. General Linievitch told Douglas that at the Yalu river the Russians would make a stand with their utmost force as it is recognized as the key to Liao Tung and practically to Korea. The Russians are well aware that the Japanese are assembling in strength on the east side of the Yalu and compute their numbers at 50,000 all arms. The Russians have at Liao Yang some magnificent cavalry and artillery, while their infantry battalions are made up of chosen drafts from the European regiments of the line now serving in Poland, on the Prussian, Austrian and Balkan frontiers.

Rev. Mr. Douglas expressed astonishment to learn that there had been no great land battle since he left Liao Yang, as there it was considered imminent. General-in-Chief Kuropatkin was to arrive at Liao Yang and take up headquarters about the middle of March. The Russian officers of the general staff express indifference to the fate of Port Arthur and Vladivostok, declaring they don't count in comparison with the holding of the Yalu,

which Russia will not evacuate except under signal reverse of war.

Mr. Douglas says large numbers of heavy cannon of modern pattern are arriving every week at Liao Yang to be used in the early works and hidden batteries. A military cordon of three miles has been drawn around Liao Yang, penetrable only by Chinese.

Mr. Douglas and his family left Manchuria because of the immediate likelihood of a conflict between the hostile armies.

TYPICAL OF GERMANY.

Kaiser's Transportation Exhibit at World's Fair.

St. Louis, April 20.—Germany's exhibit in the transportation department at the world's fair is so large that a considerable part of it is made on space outside the Palace of Transportation.

The exhibit of track and structure is located on a track 600 by 125 feet between the Palace of Forestry, Fish and Game Administration building. There are 4200 feet of track and four buildings, a "blockhouse," 15 by 23 feet, which is the general train dispatcher's office; an electric switch tower 40 by 15 feet; a mechanical switch tower, 21 by 25 feet, and a typical railroad station building, 25 by 17 feet.

The buildings are of typical German architecture, with high pitched roofs covered with red and green tiles, medieval oriel windows and ornate outside stairways. The switch and signal systems will be in operation.

New Oil Fields.

RAILWAY INTERESTS MERGE.

"Community of Interests" Arrangement Between Lines in New York.

New York, April 20.—A "community of interests" arrangement between the Metropolitan and the Belmont subway interests may be the outcome of a four-hour conference between August Belmont and Harry Payne Whitney, says the Tribune.

Authorization for the construction of a second system of subways is expected in the near future and the Metropolitan street railway interests are said in financial circles to have determined to make a strong bid for the constructing of the new tunnel. Thus far it has been impossible to corroborate the rumors, but surface railway men are confident that all the street railway interests, underground, surface and elevated in this city will be consolidated within three years and perhaps sooner than that if the proposed plan for connecting the various bridges is adopted and financed.

BILL CAUSES STRIKE.

Government-Owned Railroad in Hungary Tied Up.

Buda Pest, April 20.—Owing to dissatisfaction with the government bill for the regulation of wages, a strike has broken out on the government-owned Hungarian Western railway. The orient express from Paris due here at 11 o'clock last night is stalled at Parkanyana, and the express in the opposite direction will be diverted to the Sentral station via Breuck, which part of the system is still working. It is expected that the men on other government lines will strike today. They complain that the premier has not fulfilled his promise to increase wages.


