**OVERWORKED DOCTORS PREY TO TUBERCULOSIS**

**Physicians Attending Patients at Bellevue Become Victims of Dread Disease They Seek to Cure.**

New York, April 21.—Several physicians at Bellevue hospital have suddenly contracted tuberculosis from association with patients in the institution. House Surgeon Robert S. MacDonald is the most seriously affected and his death is expected hourly. According to the hospital authorities, members of the staff have been greatly run down by overwork and thus became peculiarly susceptible to the

dread disease. Negligence on the part of the tuberculosis patients, they say, is the direct cause. Persons in that ward should, under the regulations, expectorate in receptacles provided for such use, but the doctors say whenever an attendant's back is turned they spit on the floor and thus generate germs which are certain to spread disease if inhaled by persons in the least run down physically.

**STEEL MEN CONFER.**

International Meeting for the Reservation of Home Markets.

New York, April 21.—Representatives of the great steel manufacturers of the United States, Great Britain, Germany, Austria and Belgium, are reported to be in secret conference in London with a view to arranging for the reservation of home markets, the prevention of dumping and the fixing of uniform export prices. The project originated with the German syndicate. It is understood the French manufacturers are sympathetic but are not represented in the conference because their exports are small.

Negotiations were taken up about three months ago by the leading interests, originally with the idea of regulating prices in neutral markets, but the British manufacturers insisted that England be included because German ships to that market at least 1,000,000 tons of steel product yearly. This resulted in the calling of the present conference for a discussion of the whole question of export prices in all markets, including those of plates, rails, structural steel and semi-products. The first difficulty was the non-existence of a combination of British manufacturers, who include 12 groups. There is a fair prospect that this will be overcome. The second obstacle is the fact that several English manufacturers are also great consumers who have profited by the dumping of foreign steel billets on the English market. The third is the problem of a control or check on operations. This is under consideration.

**WILL PRODUCE MOYER.**

President of the Miners' Union Being Escorted to Denver.

Telluride, Col., April 20.—General Bell started today with President Moyer of the Western Federation of Miners for Denver, where Moyer will be produced before the supreme court in answer to the writ of habeas corpus. They were accompanied by an escort of troopers.

**Schwab in 'Frisco.**

San Francisco, April 20.—Charles M. Schwab, former president of the United States Steel Corporation, is here. He is accompanied by a number of New Yorkers. Mr. Schwab has been visiting some mines in Nevada in which he is interested and he said that he will largely increase his holdings before leaving for his home. His visit to the west is one of business combined with pleasure.

**Davis Will Filed.**

San Francisco, April 20.—The will of Samuel Davis, who died here on April 5, has just been filed for record. He left an estate valued at between \$1,000,000 and \$1,500,000. His heirs are his sister Jane Davis, living at Galway, N. Y.; Henry W. Davis, a nephew, and Mrs. Mary Stone, a niece living at Churchill, N. Y.

**Congressional Committee Officers.**

Washington, April 20.—The democratic congressional campaign committee tonight elected Charles Edwards secretary. The old officers were then elected unanimously: J. T. Pearcey, assistant secretary; James T. Norris, treasurer; J. J. Sinnott, J. W. Marmaduke, sergeant at arms. Chairman Cowherd was authorized to name the committee.

**Aged Writer is Dead.**

New Rochelle, N. Y., April 20.—Mrs. Sarah Jane Lippincott, better known as Grace Greenwood, a writer of books for children, died today in her 81st year.

**Dolliver on Trusts.**

Washington, April 20.—The senate today listened to a set speech of al-

most two hours' duration on the trusts by Dolliver and afterwards completed consideration of the civil appropriation bill, again devoting much time to provisions for the extension of the east front of the capitol.

**Bill Back to Senate.**

Washington, April 20.—The house today after an extended debate sent the naval appropriation bill back to congress, the only disputed senate amendment accepted being that providing for construction in the navy yards of two collieries.

**Hart Beats Ruhlin.**

Philadelphia, April 20.—Marvin Hart had the better of a six-round fight to-night with Gus Ruhlin.

**Strings of Noses.**

In a paper read by Miss Adele M. Fields before the section of biology of the New York Academy of Sciences, the joints composing the antennae of ants were described as a series of noses, each having a special function. The first joint distinguishes the ant's native nest from the nest of an enemy; the second discriminates between the odor of ants of different colonies, but of the same species; the third discerns the scent of the track left by the scent of the ant's own feet and enables it to return over its route; the fourth and fifth joints discover the distinctive odor of the larvae, and if removed disables the ant from caring for the young in a nest; the sixth and seventh joints make known the presence of an ant of different species. Only after these joints are developed will ants of different species fight one another.—Youth's Companion.
