SMALL CAUSE FOR ANXIETY

Lack of Depth at Mouth of Columbia Not at All Surprising at Present Time.

GREATEST WORK TO BE DONE

Jetty Extension Will Be Rushed and Bar Dredge Will Put in Her First Effective Time This Summer.

Those who have followed the progress of the harbor work at the mouth of the river are not very much concerned because of the moderate depth of the bar. The statement that pilots and masters generally report less depth than at previous times is not doubted, but it is not difficult to find reason for this.

Some months ago the channel at the mouth of the river closed up to material extent and a new channel opened. Since then this new channel has been used, and what little work the Chinook has been able to do has been done with the idea in view of deepening this new channel. The jetty work has been practically at a standstill for months past, and the loss of a portion of the breakwater during the winter was not calculated to maintain the depth previously noted. There has been no effective work of the part of the Chinook, because of unfavorable weather conditions, and the jetty has been reduced in length rather than extended.

Among those who have carefully gone into the matter there is no question that the jetty and dredge will provide the necessary depth, and all agree that the spur jetty from the north shore, which has been talked of, will not be essential to deepening of the harbor entrance. While the opinion prevails that the jetty is not being built high enough to accomplish the results sought to be attained, the engineers appear to be satisfied, and a change in the plans is unlikely.

That complaint should be made at this time is surprising, in view of the fact that it seemingly emanates from those who were directly instrumental in getting the Chinook here. It is felt by members of the commercial bodies that the Chinook should be given a reasonable opportunity to demonstrate what she can do toward bettering conditions at the mouth of the river. Captain Dunbar and all of his officers say they will be able to provide the necessary depth. While they would naturally make sanguine statements regarding their own vessel, the belief is expressed that the dredge will prove a valuable addition to the harbor, and with a stretch of good weather show what can be done. The summer season is now coming on and the Chinook will be able to put in almost every day. After a month's steady work, if the bar is not materially deepened, the dredge may be regarded as pretty much of a doubtful proposition; but in the meantime she should be given the benefit of any doubt that may exist.

As to the jetty, the engineering department of the government has adopted a policy calculated to get the best possible results. The work will be rushed, and within a few

weeks deliveries of rock will be made by two companies. The department is anxious to have the breakwater extended to that point which it aims to reach, and will rush matters to accomplish this result. The work to be done this summer will be by far the most important done at the mouth of the Columbia, and the result of the active operations should be awaited before complaint is filed.

BELIEVE IT WAS MURDER

Relatives of American Found Dead in Paris Hotel Not Impressed With Suicide Theory.

MYSTERY OF CLARKE'S DEATH

Hotel People Aver It Was Self-Destruction, Although Admitting Young Man Was Not Short of Funds.

New York, May 11.—It is asserted by the mother and sister of Harold A. Clarke, says a World dispatch from Paris, that the wealthy young Californian who found dead in his room in a Paris hotel, Monday, did not commit suicide, despite the fact that all circumstances point that way. His sister, Mrs. Lyman, said:

"Harold's body was found lying across the foot of the bed, in evening dress, with one foot crossed peacefully over the other. The hotel manager was indignant when I pointed out how easily a person could have entered the room through one of the windows. Harold was 31 years old, but did not look to be over 22. He spent Friday evening with us after his return from Monte Carlo and he was particularly gay, making light of his losses, which he admitted sustaining. He was not pressed for money, for he had a few thousand francs in the hotel office. Neither did he have any love affairs, so far as we know."

Clarke dined at a restaurant Sunday evening. He entered the hotel at about 10 p. m. The employees say they heard the shot half an hour later. Clarke had taken a revolver from the bottom of his trunk. They ridicule the idea that it was anything but suicide, but admit that Clarke had some thousands of francs in the hotel safe.
