COLUMBIA IS BACK AGAIN

O. R. & N. Steamship Arrives After Having Been Laid Up for Extensive Repairs.

IS NOW BURNING CRUDE OIL

Brought All the Freight She Could Carry and Large Number of Passengers—Other Marine News.

The deep whistle of the O. R. & N. steamship Columbia, so familiar to Astorians, sounded along the river front yesterday. The Columbia had just arrived from San Francisco and her whistle was blown more than usually in celebration of her return to her run out of San Francisco. She brought all the freight she could well carry and had one of the largest passenger lists that has come north for months.

The Columbia had been off the San Francisco run for about four months. She was laid up at San Francisco for a thorough overhauling, and after being placed on the dock it was decided to install oil-burning apparatus. This necessitated further delay and the steamship was three weeks late in getting back into the service. She looks as spick and span as a new boat and is in shape to handle the heavy traffic of the summer months.

For some time the Oregon was on in the Columbia's place, but a week ago went to Seattle to engage in the Nome trade. The Nome City then was substituted, but made only one trip for the Columbia. Now the Nome City must find other means of earning dividends for her owners.

The Columbia had a large quantity of freight for Astoria and was at the dock here for two or three hours. Her passengers were enabled to come ashore and look around the city, and many of them visited the canneries during the afternoon. Late in the afternoon the Columbia left up the river.

SAN JOSE UNDER REPAIR.

Will Take Place of Pulitzer While Latter is Being Overhauled.

The pilot schooner San Jose, the property of the state of Oregon, was yesterday taken from her berth at the O. R. & N. dock around Smith Point where she will be repaired. The repairs to the schooner will be made under the direction of Captain Campbell, chairman of the board of pilot commissioners. Her bottom will be cleaned and new paint will give her a more attractive appearance.

The San Jose will, during the coming summer, be placed in service while the Joseph Pulitzer is being overhauled. The Pulitzer has been in service all winter and has seen much hard weather. When shipping is quiet the Pulitzer will be laid off. She will be taken to Portland and there placed in the dry-dock, where her bottom will be cleaned and painted and other repairs made. It is likely the San Jose will come off the ways within a short time and that the Pulitzer will go into service immediately.

The steamer Vosburg arrived yesterday from Tillamook with another raft of logs for local mills. The Vosburg will probably be engaged in this business all summer.

After all the registrations were in the lists were checked and the names rearranged in those cases where voters had moved from one precinct to another. This work was quite extensive every name on the rolls being checked off. The books are now in shape to go to the judges of election.

Estimates of the number of people who have not registered vary, but the belief is general that the city will cast a much greater vote than 1617. The country has registered fully, and it is probable the vote will fall below the registration. The vote of the city will depend largely upon the supply of fish around election day. If fish are plentiful, the fishermen will remain out on the river, while if the supply is poor they will exercise their elective franchise.

READY FOR CHICAGO DERBY.

English Lad Favorite of the Fourteen Horses Carded to Start.

Chicago, May 20.—Fourteen of the original nominations which numbered 80 are listed to start in the Chicago derby to be run at the opening of Hawthorne tomorrow. Outside the American derby, the Chicago derby is richest race for 3-year-olds in the west and some of the best colts that have ever faced the barrier will run. The indications are that English Lad will go to the post the favorite, his odds tonight being 3 to 1. Proceeds is next at 6 to 1, while the other 12 are strung out at from 8 to 1 to 30 to 1. Of the 14 horses carded to start, Flower King is the dark horse as he has never won. If the track is fast Proceeds will probably be scratched.

ATHLETES TO CHICAGO.

Stanford Men Expect to Take Second Place in Meet.

Stanford University, May 20.—Eight of Stanford's best athletes left today for Chicago to compete in the western intercollegiate field meet to be held there June 4. They are S. S. Homan mile and half runner; W. F. Dunn, who holds the Pacific coast quarter-mile record; Norman Dole, world's record pole vaulter; J. M. Beach, pole vaulter; R. F. West and W. H. Beach, broad jumpers; W. H. Lanagan, Denver, high and low hurdles, and O. E. Hyde, who holds intercollegiate record, 16-pound shot put. The team expects to take second place.
