TATOOSH IS BACK AGAIN

Bar Tug Resumes Service After Month's Idleness Because of Shipping Inactivity.

ANOTHER JOB FOR WALLULA

Will Be Engaged in Towing Rock Barges to Fort Stevens for Few Weeks—Marine Notes.

Captain Bailey's ship, the bar tug Tatoosh, yesterday resumed service at the mouth of the Columbia. For a month previously she had been laid up, but will probably continue in service from this time on. The Wallula, which had alone been attending to the shipping interests of the river, now leaves the bar service and will be engaged in towing rock barges to Fort Stevens for a few weeks.

The Tatoosh was laid up when shipping fell off. During the past month there has not been enough activity to justify the operation of one of the tugs. The lumber trade was brisk, but the big Oriental freighters which carry away the grain product of the inland empire put a kink in the blue-water business, and few ships have arrived here in consequence. The fall grain fleet will soon begin arriving, however, and it is likely the Tatoosh will be steadily engaged from now on. The Wallula has been engaged by Hale & Kern, which is filling its contract for delivery of rock at Fort Stevens. The firm owns the tug Samson, but she is being overhauled, and the work will require some time. When the Samson is ready for service she will take the place of the Wallula, which will then go back to the bar service.

FREIGHT RATES ADVANCED.

Lumber Tariff Increased 50 Cents From Astoria and Portland.

Freight rates for carrying lumber on the coasters between Astoria and Portland and California ports have been increased 50 cents per 1000 feet. The old rates were \$4 to San Francisco, and \$5 to San Pedro. Now they are \$4.50 and \$5.50. Shippers say the advance has been made on account of the limited amount of available tonnage. Since the northern trade has opened up a great many of the coasters have found profitable employment in Alaskan waters. As a result, it is said the probabilities are there will be no idle off-shore vessels for the next four or five months, at least.

Marine Notes.

The steamer Elmore departed yesterday for Tillamook bay points.

The barkentine Gleaner arrived Tuesday night from San Francisco to load lumber at Knappaon.

The steamer Aberdeen departed yesterday for San Francisco. She took 475,000 feet of lumber.

The schooner Zampa, with a cargo of lumber, arrived down the river yesterday afternoon, but did not clear.

The gasoline schooner Rio Rey arrived yesterday from Rogue river. She came in ballast, with the exception of a consignment of 10 tons of salt.

The British ship Beacon Rock, just arrived from Antwerp, brings 4500 barrels of cement and a quantity of liquors, oils and other similar stuff.

The Vosburg brought 180,000 feet of logs on her last trip from Nehalem. Report has it that she will hereafter be engaged in the towing business at Tillamook and Nehalem, and that she will not come around to Astoria with log rafts.

The steamer Chico arrived yesterday from San Francisco. She brought 7000 sacks of cement for Balfour Guthrie & Co. and 800 sacks of cement for S. Elmore & Co. In addition she has 200 barrels of asphalt for the first named firm.

The steamship Columbia departed yesterday for San Francisco. She took away almost 6000 sacks of flour. At Astoria she loaded a large quantity of shooks and oysters.

MUTINY AMONG COOLIES.

Trouble on the Steamer Empress of Japan at Hongkong.

Victoria, B. C., June 1.—Colonel Hamilton, the British government special commissioner to the Imperial Chinese government, arrived on the steamship Empress of Japan last night after successfully negotiating with the Chinese government for the sending of upwards of half a million coolies to work in the South African diamond and gold mines. Some days before the Empress left Hongkong a mutiny broke out among the coolies in their big pen on the Kowloon side. They were dissatisfied with the conditions under which they were about to be deported, and began to smash things. The troops were called out and the mutiny was suppressed. A number of the coolies were injured in the melee.

TORRENTS OF WATER.

Endangering Life and Property in Wyoming and Idaho.

Cheyenne, Wyo., June 1.—Word has just reached this city of a terrific flood which swept down the valley of Horse creek, 20 miles north of Cheyenne, yesterday afternoon. The flood followed a tremendous fall of rain about the head waters of the creek and within a short time the creek was transformed into a torrent from 200 yards to half a mile in width. It is said that the damage to ranch property will be immense. There is no report of loss of life.

It is reported that the Colorado & Southern bridge across Horse Creek was washed away, but the rumor cannot be confirmed.

JAPANESE COMMISSIONER.

Will Journey to Washington in Interest of Immigration.

Victoria, B. C., June 1.—A passenger by the steamship Empress of Japan was T. Aoyagi, special immigration commissioner from the Japanese government bound to Ottawa and Washington, D. C., to confer with the Canadian and United States governments regarding the immigration of Japanese laborers. He says that he comes empowered to accept the suggestion of each government that still further restrictions be placed on emigration from Japan. The Japanese government is perfectly willing, he says, to prohibit the further emigration if the American government does not desire an increase of their Japanese residents.

NEW BUILDING LAWS.

New York Will Make Attempt to Prevent Accidents.

New York, June 1.—A new building ordinance has been adopted by the board of aldermen. It is designed to prevent such disasters as the collapse a few months ago of the Hotel Darlington, entailing a loss of nearly a score of lives. The new regulation gives the superintendent of buildings power to enforce his orders.

When the Darlington collapsed, inspectors of the building department said they had filed the necessary "violations" against the building, but that the contractors paid no particular attention to them. The new ordinance empowers the superintendent, without the formality of applying to the court for an order, immediately to stop work on a building when conditions warrant such a stoppage.

London's Oldest Church.

Horses are stabled in London's oldest church, such is the unfashionable state into which this holy edifice has fallen. Most London visitors know Smithfield and the venerable church of St. Bartholomew. This ancient pile once included a great priory and a hospital—built nearly 800 years ago. Its founder was Rahere, a witty courtier of Henry I, who, in his advancing years, became a pious canon of St. Paul's. Rahere raised money for his church by telling the story that St. Bartholomew appeared to him in a vision in Rome and bade him raise the church, and pointed to the spot on the marsh at Smithfield. At the dissolution of the monasteries by Henry VIII the priory and the cloister were abandoned. The citizens preserved the hospital, which is flourishing in these days. But of Rahere's old church only the choir and the cloisters remain. All that is left has, thanks to the present rector, been restored excepting the west cloisters. Some £20,000 has been spent on the pious work, but another £1500 is needed before the west cloisters, now used as a stable, can be restored. The old Norman arches are now bricked
