

PRODUCE IS DULL

Storm Keeps Farmers and Shoppers at Home.

Eggs Growing Dearer Each Day—Coal Oil Slumps a Half Cent—Millers Talk of Advancing Their Products—Local Produce Prices.

Portland, Jan. 13.—The produce market was not a hustling institution today on account of the storm that has kept out the farmers and kept the early shoppers within doors.

To retailers it will be of benefit to note the slump in the price of coal oil which dropped a half cent all around. Fresh ranch eggs have gone up to 30 cents a dozen and are very firm at that figure.

Oranges are rather a drug on account of the failure of interior towns to work off their holiday supply, thus leaving the local commission men with too many on hand.

Millstuffs are strong on account of the weather, and the millers are taking of advancing prices for the next month or two.
