**PAY FOR CITY HALL**

**The Common Council Meets and Transacts Much Business.**

**ADJOURNED UNTIL FRIDAY**

**Common Council Has so Much Business Adjournment Until Friday Is Necessary—Petitions and Remonstrances Heard—Many Ordinances Passed.**

The Common council met in regular session last evening, the mayor and all members being present except Beland.

Petition from the Astoria City band asking permission to use the attic of the new City Hall for rehearsals. The petition was referred to the committee on public property.

Petition from A. C. Anderson asking permission to construct a sidewalk on Sixth street was referred to the street committee.

Petition from the school board asking for a room in the new City Hall for the superintendent of schools was referred to the public property committee.

Remonstrance from the property-owners on Eighth street against the improvement of that street in the manner proposed and asking that it be improved to its full width and macadamized with cement sidewalks, was referred to the street committee. The city surveyor stated that the property would not stand the assessments. City Attorney Smith stated that if the street was improved, two of the houses would be undermined, and the property-owners would not pay the assessment and the city had no funds to pay the excess relative to the drain on his property, was referred to the street committee.

Communication from H. Spellmire, relative to the sidewalk on Franklin avenue, asking that the walk be repaired, was referred to the street committee.

Communication from Ben Young relative to cattle running at large in Upper Astoria was referred to the chief of police, with instructions to catch the cows and put them in the pound.

Report of the committee on petition of Frank Patton, refunding \$12 for street assessments, was adopted.

M. Gorman was granted a retail liquor license, and Lee Herring was given permission to transfer his license.

The bill of Emil Schacht for \$860, balance due on superintending the construction of the City Hall, and \$170 railroad fare from Portland, was ordered paid.

Ordinance appropriating money out of the general fund for the benefit of Robinson & Hilderbrand and Charles Heilborn & Son, for furniture for the new City Hall.

Ordinance establishing the grade of Alameda avenue was passed.

Ordinance providing for the time and manner of improving Eighth street was withdrawn.

Ordinance providing for the improvement of Fourteenth street from Grand to Jerome avenue was passed.

Ordinance providing for the improvement of Columbia avenue was passed.

Ordinance providing for the repairing of Commercial street from Twentieth street to the Clatsop mill by redecking the street, except as to the street railway was passed.

Ordinance providing for the improvement of Duane street from Tenth to Twelfth streets was passed.

Ordinance appropriating \$853.36 for the benefit of Emil Schacht was passed.

Ordinance appropriating \$1,607.50 for the benefit of William G. McPherson & Co. was passed.

Ordinance appropriating \$6,453 for the benefit of Ferguson & Houston was passed.

Ordinance appropriating \$4,263.91 for the benefit of Ferguson & Houston for extra work on the new City Hall was laid over for investigation.

Resolutions authorizing the board of assessors to make the assessments on Third street, alley way in Upper Astoria, Ninth street, Hume avenue and Commercial street, in Uniontown, were adopted.

Resolutions for the improvement of Alameda avenue was adopted.

The matter of selling the old brick engine house on Astor street was referred to the committee on public property. The intention of the city is to sell the property at auction, if necessary, as the city is deriving no benefit from it.

The request of the regatta committee for the use of certain streets was granted.

The council adjourned until Friday evening.

**BIG RUN AT LAST**

**Largest Salmon Run of the Year Enters the River.**

**TEN TONS IN TWO YEARS**

**Prophecy of Old-time Fishermen Fulfilled—Large Run Enters River—Sanborn Seiner Catches Ten Tons in Two Drifts—Sardines Plentiful.**

As predicted by old-time fishermen that a large run of salmon would come with the full of the moon, their prophecy was fulfilled yesterday morning, and the largest run of salmon that has been in the river this year came in yesterday morning.

Jack Service, who is seining for Sanborn & Co., caught ten tons on two drifts. As a rule, the large runs invariably follow along close to Sand island, particularly near the Great Republic. Fishermen also noticed millions of sound sardines that are fast coming into the river following, as usual, a big run of salmon.

The bar pilots reported Sunday that there were large numbers of salmon outside the bar. There will be nothing from the gillnet fishermen until this morning's deliveries. A continuation of the run will pull the cannerymen out and bring their pack up to last year.
