Portland, Sept. 23.—Hoggrowers have to pay 16¢ cents a yard for what burlap they use in baling this year.

The cost of burlap at such figures runs into money very fast, and for the crop of 1905 will amount to \$80,000 on the basis of 100,000 bales of hogs, at a cost per bale for burlap of 80 cents.

Large quantities of potatoes were received from the adjacent country yesterday, but exporters aver that there is little or no outside demand.

Considerable poor beef is coming in to meet a high demand. This class of meat is mostly used in the manufacture of sausage, and so the demand at best is limited.

Receipts of livestock on foot are light. Fat steers are in good demand at \$3.00 to \$3.25; wethers, \$3.25 to \$3.50; good lambs, at \$4.00 to \$4.25.

Fresh eggs are more plentiful and the prices for the best incline to drop a cent.

Good apples are scarce and prices are likely to advance, in the opinion of many dealers.

Watermelons are inclined to be a drug on account of the cool weather.
