LUMBERMEN'S WOES

Their Cry of Cars, More Cars, Pass all Unheeded.

MARKET STRONG, PRICES GOOD

All Cars Needed to Move Great Wheat Crops Say Railroad Officials, so Mill Men Must Suffer the Consequences Good Markets But No Transportation.

The following article from the Tacoma Ledger will no doubt throw some light on the disadvantages under which the lumbermen, not only of southwestern Washington, but every other section of the northwest continually labors in their effort to place the output of their mills on the market:

"Cars, cars, and again cars is what every lumberman in the state of Washington is in need of, and what he is begging and at times demanding," said Harry McCormick of McCormick, Lewis county, president of the Southwestern Washington Lumber Manufacturers' association, last night at the Donnelly. The H. McCormick Lumber company employs more than 200 men in its mills and logging camps, and Mr. McCormick is in a position to speak with authority as to lumber conditions in southwestern Washington.

"We have not had enough cars for weeks," continued Mr. McCormick, "and there are carloads and carloads of lumber cut to particular orders waiting for means of transportation. The market is strong and firm, at good prices, but what good does that do us if we cannot get our goods to market? The Northern Pacific people say they are doing all for us that they can, and perhaps they are, but they must do a lot more if they have any intention of relieving the present congestion of the lumber trade in this state. It is pleaded as an excuse that the need of cars to haul wheat and crops generally is the cause of the stringency, but that cause alone would not be sufficient. Never before in the history of the lumber trade in this state has the car shortage been so great or so serious to the lumberman.

"You see, it is not only that the yards and docks of the mills are crowded to their utmost, but a great majority of the lumber has been cut to order and is of a particular size or kind that does not run in the ordinary course of trade. As a result the dealer ordering it from this state finds this work delayed because we cannot ship him his lumber; he cannot wait, and cancels his order, so we lose not only the order, but the work on the material, which must be cut all over again to ordinary market sizes. I am satisfied that much of the delay is the result of the telegraphers' strike a short while ago. That delayed orders, and the railroads have not facilities to catch up with the work, and at the same time handle the larger amount of freight constantly piling up on them in this state."

"No," continued Mr. McCormick, "we have not stopped the mills or the cutting yet, and will not so long as we can find a hole to store the lumber in, but if we do not get some cars mighty soon we will be forced to—at least slow down. At present we are more than 50 carloads behind, and it is all in the piles waiting for the cars.

"As to shingles, we stopped cutting them four months ago, and shall cut no more until the present surplus is used up, although the price is fair. I think that is the stand of all the big mills. In my opinion the brokers, and principally those in Seattle are the cause of the weakness in the shingle market. They advance money to the little mills that need it in their business, so the little fellows keep on cutting shingles, and the surplus has no chance to lessen. The big mills have, I think, about concluded to keep their shingles in the logs until matters are straightened out."

who now took her as his wife. On account of this indignity King Aretas made war on Herod and defeated Herod and but for intervention of the Roman army, King Aretas would have annihilated Herod's army and have taken him prisoner. Herod was on his way to meet Aretas in battle and was stopping at the castle of Cachaerus, a rocky fortress east of the Dead sea. Herod ventured out to beg John to preach and John rebuked him for his immoral life which aroused the wrath of Herodias, who sought revenge. The occasion came at the celebration of the king's birthday, when Herodias sent her daughter Salome into the guest chamber to dance the Oriental dance. The king according to custom having offered to give her what she might ask, Salome sought her mother and returned with a request for the head of John the Baptist on a charger. An executioner was dispatched for the tragedy and when he returned with the head, Jerome says, Hercules thrust bodkins and pins through the tongue of John. Herod was afterward summoned to Rome and exiled to Lyons and died in Spain.

The king's troubles did not end when he had murdered his accuser. He had added another cause for his downfall. John was Herod's best friend. Had Herod heeded John's advice he would have avoided battle, and defeat and exile.

Then comes a day of reckoning for every man, kings and commoners. Happy the man who reasons and heeds warnings. Unhappy the man who flatters himself that might makes right. Herod despised John. Jesus said John was the greatest of human beings. You know the value of Herod. John's rebuke of the king before a large assembly shook the faith of the masses in Herod, and his men did not go to war with such spirit in such a cause and the battle was lost. It may have been John's speech that weakened the ardor of the imperial guards and cost Herod his crown. It pays to listen to God's message.

It is often severe and disagreeable. The results of not listening to it, may be far worse as in this case.

This was the best sermon John ever preached and it was to royalty. Decapitation was the reward for the sermon. John Chrysostom rebuked the wit of Caesar and was exiled, death ransomed him. Mad auditors indicate true sermons.

Many a preacher has lost his pulpit by doing his duty. What a glorious loss! Every Herod needs a John. The Herods who mistake John's message, go to their Waterloo."

First Lutheran.

Notes from the sermon preached by Rev. Gustaf Rydquist at First Lutheran church:

This is the Angel Michael's day. But we do not celebrate the days as saints and angels for the purpose of worshipping these, but for the purpose of placing them before us as an object lesson of purity and holiness. As the saints in their day trod the pathway of life in the footsteps of the Savior, so we are called upon to emulate their example. With the thought of Angels we always associate the idea of celestial purity, and we cannot suppress the longing of being like unto them, and be with them in glory.

Regarding the angels we know but little. The Bible does not give us a complete history of these celestial beings. They are only mentioned here and there in performing their missions. Sometimes the forces of nature are mentioned as angels, messengers of God, but apart from these there are personalities in the spiritual world called angels, with angels missions, as ministers and messengers of God. They are created beings. Their creation took place some time before the creation of man. The fall of man was preceded by a fall in the angelic world, when Satan and his host were thrust out of heaven into the abyss of space into the region of outer darkness. The angels are spirits, but they occupy a certain defined space and have a definite form. They are not created out of the gross material of this world. They are not spirits in the

sense that they are immaterial or opposed to matter, but rather incorporated. Paul says "there is a material body and there is a spiritual body." We can therefore conceive of a substance ethereal or celestial above gross matter belonging to the higher sphere of spirits and the spiritual world.

The missions of the good angel vary according to their positions. Among the angels there are orders and ranks. To the Hebrew mind in the Old Testament, the angels were divided into the orders of chief princes, princes ministers and messengers. Paul speaks of them as principalities and powers. Our Savior makes a beautiful allusion to the angels in referring to them as "guardian angels."

Michael is designated as the great prince in Dan. 12:1, or as it is transcribed in the New Testament by the word of archangel.

As we said before, we cannot establish a definite doctrine of the angels, and it matters not. It is not essential for us to know our salvation does not depend upon our knowledge of angels. When we shall be able to discern spirits by seeing then shall also the angels be revealed to us in their glory and majesty. The gospel for today seems to associate the idea of angels and children. As man enters this world and as he passes away he is attended by angels. There is where he seems to be more helpless. There is an object lesson of the helplessness of man at the cradle. And when death takes him in his cold embrace he is harmless. As children are attended by angelic guards, there must be a possibility of development into the likeness of the angels.

If parents had in mind the words of our text: "Fate held that ye despise not one of these little ones, for I say unto you, that in heaven their angels do always behold the face of my father." (Matt. 18:10) there would be more good children in our homes. They would be little angels indeed. Do not treat them as heathens, but make them and keep them children of God and their angels shall rejoice with you.

You also must be like a child in purity, faith and obedience. "He who does not receive the kingdom of God as a little child shall in no wise enter therein." There is only one exegic to this text.

To receive Christ we must grow away from self and the consciousness of our own greatness and power and become utterly dependent upon God as a little child.

When we bring our children to the Savior in holy baptism there is an object lesson for us, how we shall be minded in receiving Christ.

The relation of the guardian angel to a human being is not confined to childhood, but the children of God of whatever age has his angel representing him before God and the saints. You can imagine faintly what it means that there is joy among the angels over one sinner that repented. The angels are in full sympathy with man. When creation was finished the angels sang praises to God. When Christ was born to redeem fallen man, the angels sang their "Gloria in Excelsis."

Wherever God has visited man in love, angels have been present. If in their sympathy they rejoice with man, may they not also weep with him, in his sorrows, in his misfortunes, in his woes, weep over his waywardness and if it comes to that over his condemnation.

Did you ever see "Montague's angel" that beautiful painting, which represents a sorrowing angel. If you studied it and have some conception of art you found not tears shed, but a face expressing sympathetic sorrow in every line and feature. There is something called divine sorrow, why not there also be an angelic sorrow. Sorrow is not always weeping.

Did you ever notice it raining while the sun was shining in its brightness, it seems to be a contradiction. So there can be an undertone of sorrow in the smile, and in the celestial happiness of angels, a touch of the same in their sympathy for man.

There is wisdom and beauty in creation's plan, and in contemplating it our souls are filled with wonder, devotion, and love to our Creator and God.
