HAD READ RAFFLES

Prominent Man Commits a Number of Daring Robberies.

CONFESSES TO THE POLICE

Charles Boos Held a High Salaried Position With Transportation Company and Was Supposed to Be a Busy Man, But He Found Time to Rob Buildings

Middletown, N. Y., Oct. 24.—By the alleged confession of Charles Boos, until a few days ago Superintendent of the Walkill Transit Company's lines in Orange, a spectacular police mystery has been solved. According to the police he admitted to them yesterday that he had robbed one of the largest department stores in the city besides several residences in the last few months.

Boos jestingly reminded police that he, himself, had raised the hue and cry one night a few weeks ago when a burglar was chased out of the residence of F. P. S. Crane, a wealthy man. He said the police were so close to him before he got out of the house that he ran ahead of them shouting, "stop thief, catch that man!" This ruse worked so well that Boos resorted to it again a few nights later when he had forced his way into the home of J. L. Pendleton and from which he was frightened by an alarm.

A Modern Social Highwayman. Boos is regarded as a modern social highwayman. He drew a large salary as superintendent of the big transit corporation and lived in good style in apartments on one of the best streets in the city. He was popular in society and dressed in the latest fashion. He was apparently one of the busiest men in the town, and had no time for anything but work, and seemed an exemplary man of business.

Great was the amazement when it became known last Friday that Boos had been arrested and locked up. The charge against him was made by the officials of the Transit Company. It was charged that the superintendent had stolen a large quantity of copper wire from the company and sold it to a junk dealer.

A subsequent search of Boos' fine apartments revealed plunder for which the police had been looking and which, it is alleged was taken from a department store and private residences. Confronted with the goods, Boos, it is said confessed.

Boos' bachelor apartments were the best in town and incidentally he had added to their comfort by tapping the wires of the company from which he drew a large salary and furnishing his rooms with five incandescent lights.

THREW AWAY PRECIOUS PILLS

Pennsylvania Physician Makes an Expensive Mistake.

Kittanning, Pa.—When Dr. S. A. Jessup happened to enter the bedroom of his sister he was indignant to see on her dressing table a pill box which bore the inscription "strychnine."

Dr. Jessup had prescribed strychnine for his sister for a tonic, but his indignation was caused by the fact that she should allow the box containing the deadly pellet to remain within reach of the children. He threw the box through the open window. Then he went down stairs, his "dander" thoroughly up, looking for his sister.

But Mr. Jessup only got a few words of his remarks out. His sister uttered a scream when she learned that the doctor had thrown the box out of the window.

Last night for three hours everybody in the neighborhood searched with lanterns for the missing pill box. Finally it was found, to the great relief of the doctor and his sister. It contained \$1,200 worth of unmounted diamonds.

REMARKABLE FISH CAUGHT IN A REMARKABLE WELL

Best Piscatorial Story of the Season Comes From LeSueur, Minnesota—Sounds Fishy.

LeSueur, Minn., Oct. 24.—Mrs. Bernice Windrow, a wealthy widow, who owns and manages a 400-acre farm on the banks of Lake Tibber, in this county, was in town today with a 35-pound pickerel for sale, which she caught in a remarkable well on her farm.

Five years ago, while a well-digger was engaged in digging a deep well in the granite formation that underlies the farm, the bottom suddenly fell out of the top of the well, when the water rushed in, nearly drowning the well-digger, who, however, was borne by the waer to within 50 feet of the top of the well, where he supported himself by swimming until he was rescued. Since that time the well has always

been abundantly supplied with large fish, which are supposed to enter it through an underground passage from the lake.

There are many kinds, but bass, catfish and pickerel predominate, and the supply is worth \$50 a year as a food for the farm. They are caught with hook and line and are particularly numerous in the winter when the lake is frozen over. Many attempts have been made by other persons who have land bordering on the lake to obtain similar wells, but all have failed. The lake is in many places over 300 feet deep, and the well has been sounded to a depth of 500 feet without finding bottom.

TELEGRAPHIC BRIEFS.

Secretary Taft will recommend to Congress that the number of artillerymen in the army be increased in order that there may be enough men to man the coast defenses.

Secretary Wilson does not intend to go outside of his own department for the additional meat inspectors to be employed under the new plan.

Major General Wood has arrived at Manila and will assume command of the military during the absence of General Corbin.

Theodore Roosevelt, Jr., will join the Douglas Athletic Club at Chelsea, because of its boxing.

Baron Speck Von Sternberg left Berlin Monday on board the Kaiser Wilhelm II to join his post at Washington, D. C. Before leaving he expressed himself as hopeful that a tariff war between America and Germany would be avoided.

The firm of Reboulin, Filis & Company, manufacturers of fruit glasses, with head offices in New York, is in the hands of receivers. It is said that the assets are large enough to pay all liabilities.

Mayor Dunne of Chicago wants to try the referendum on the question as to whether or not saloons shall be closed on Sunday, looking upon that method as the only way of settling the question satisfactorily.

"Black Jack" Gallagher, accused of many crimes in connection with labor troubles and against whom several charges are pending in the courts is nearing the end of his career, being very low with consumption.

Newspapers have been ranked as a text book in the Northwestern University in Chicago and hereafter students in the American history class must come to the recitation room prepared to answer questions on the news of the day.

Rumors are persistent in Washington, D. C., that within six months after the reopening of Congress that the complexion of the Cabinet will be completely changed. It is not thought that every member of the Cabinet will go out, but there will be two or three new members and probably three radical changes in position before the end of the current fiscal year.

W. C. T. U. DELEGATES CUT WINE SAUCE FROM MENU

Objectionable Delicacy Stricken from Dining Car Bill of Fare—Car Smelling of Tobacco Set Out.

Colorado Springs, Oct. 24.—Five hundred Woman's Christian Temperance Union delegates, who spent yesterday in this city enroute to the national convention at Los Angeles, Colorado, stricken from the dining-car menu the wine sauce marked thereon, and at Creston, Ia., while on their way to Colorado Springs, a Pullman sleeper was detached from the first section of ten coaches and another substituted because some ungalant man had smoked a cigar in the coach.

The troubles of the delegates were not over after their arrival in this city. Two colored delegates from Michigan, probably the only two in the entire convention of 1000 members, were refused accommodations at the Alta Vista hotel, the Woman's Christian Temperance Union headquarters, and at other local hostleries in this city. The local member was appointed to provide the colored delegates with accommodations.

CHINESE NOT SLOW

Take Advantage of Laxity of the Inspectors.

GOOD EXCLUSION ARGUMENT

One Hundred More Celestials Admitted in September, 1905, Than in the Corresponding Month Last Year—Deportations for the Month Are 70 Less.

Washington, Oct. 24.—Some officials here are of the opinion that the increase in the number of Chinese who have entered the United States in the month of September, this year, is due to the fact that inspectors are not as diligent as they might be in looking into Chinese conditions, and that this lack of diligence and scrutiny is based on the belief that it is pleasing to certain high officials here, who have argued strenuously against "imposing unnecessary hardships on Chinese arriving in this country."

A statement issued today by the Department of Commerce and Labor shows that there were in September, 1905, total admissions of 283, deported eleven. Of the eleven deported, nine claimed to be residents and two new arrivals. Of the total admissions and deportations there were admitted at San Francisco 214 and deported from that port seven during the month.

Total admissions during September, 1904, were 180; total deportations ninety.

The disposition of Chinese seeking admission to the United States during the month ending September 30, 1905, and also those deported, was as follows: First figures showing admissions and second deportations: United States citizens, 104, 2; returning laborers, 74, 3; returning merchants, 64, 4; other merchants, 11, 1; members of merchants' families, 17, 1; other exempt classes, 13. Total, all classes, 283, 11.

Of the 283 admitted, 242 were residents returning to the United States and forty-one were new arrivals. Of the eleven deported, nine claimed to be residents and two new arrivals.

ERNEST EDWARD FERGUSON DEAD
