PRECINCT BOUNDARIES ARE FIXED BY COUNTY COURT.

Little Change Made From Last Year—Work in Road District No. 16 to Be Done by Contract.

After transacting business all day yesterday the County Court adjourned to meet again on November 8th.

The greater part of the time was taken up with fixing the boundaries of election precincts, the law making it compulsory to fix the boundaries at the November meeting of the Court. The precincts remain the same as last year with the following exceptions:

In John Day precinct two polling places were made. No. 1 at the school house in district No. 18 and No. 2 at the Hume mill. The object of this change is to accommodate the larger number of the men employed at the mill and in that vicinity, who have heretofore been compelled to go some distance in order to vote. Two polling places were also established in Clifton precinct: No. 1 at the old Cook cannery, No. 2 at H. Anderson's residence near Blind slough. At Seaside the polling place was changed to the city engine house, and at Svensen the polling place was changed to the Red Men's hall.

The matter of the grading of Polk street was laid over until the meeting on November 8th to enable the Court to have an understanding with the City Council and see if any assistance could be had from that source in making the improvements.

In compliance with the wishes of the residents of Road District No. 16, as set forth in a petition to the Court, it was decided that money collected for taxes on that road be expended in contract work but it was deemed advisable to not make a resurvey of the road at the present time, owing to a lack of funds for successfully carrying out the work.

The clerk was instructed to call for bids for the furnishing of registers for the registration of voters at the next general election.

According to the monthly report filed by Police Judge Anderson today, the total receipts of the office for the month of October were \$39; \$45 in fines and forfeitures; \$9 from building permits, and \$5 from burial permits.

Joe Smith who has been in charge of the signal station at Fort Stevens for the past nine months has been transferred to Alaska and will leave for there on Tuesday next. He will be relieved by a man named Greene now at Seattle.

Notices for publication for nine street improvement jobs were prepared by City Auditor Anderson yesterday. The assessments were confirmed at the last meeting of the council, and the amounts will be due at the treasurer's office on November 14.

B. F. Allen & Son have leased the late habitat of the Commercial Club on Bond street, at Eleventh, and will put it in fine shape to receive their business on or about January 1st, next. When they shall have left the Hamilton Block, it owner, Attorney John F. Hamilton will equip a comfortable law office there for himself.

The copy for the delinquent tax list has been placed in the hands of the printer and the sale will take place on December 18th. When the time for paying taxes, without a penalty expired there was delinquent the sum of \$6,802.04. Since that time collections have amounted to \$2,164.29, leaving a balance of \$4,637.75 due.

West Astoria will again meet the Owapumpuns on the gridiron next Sunday afternoon. Two weeks ago these clubs met, and the game was won by the Owapumpuns, by a score of 6 to 0, and lovers of the sport are anticipating an interesting contest next Sunday. The game will be called at 2 o'clock, and an admittance fee of 25 cents charged.

Funeral service over the remains of Vient Ellen Schofield, the eight year daughter of Mr. and Mrs. W. T. Schofield, were held from the family residence at 7 o'clock yesterday morning, so that the remains could be shipped on the morning train. They will be sent to Cornelius, Ore., the home of the little girl's grandparents, where funeral services will also be held, and the remains interred. The services at the home were conducted by Rev. Seymour Short.
