### TERSE TALES OF THE TOWN

**Licensed to Wed.**—A marriage license was issued yesterday by County Clerk J. C. Clinton, in favor of Ernest Kranth and Miss Mabel H. Wesson, two young people of Clatsop.

**Cargo Shifted.**—The A. & C. people backed a car on the Fisher dock yesterday loaded with brick. The car had evidently come a long way, for the easterly end of it, as it stood on the track had been wholly "butted" out by the swaying of the bricks with which it was loaded. Constant jarring fore and aft, in stopping and starting the train, had literally shivered the end out of the car, and the contents were being unloaded for the aperture thus made.

**After Three of Them.**—Hans Hansen has filed a complaint in Judge Gosdman's court against three people charged, jointly, with malicious destruction of personal property, to wit the wilful destruction of the fence or fences, he Hansen erected lately, as a barrier against Tongue Point mill people out to the municipal highways. The arrests will be made this morning and the cases will probably be called tomorrow.

**Social Services Being Held.**—Special services are being held among the Finnish people of the city. Last evening a large audience was present to hear the sermon by Rev. L. D. Mahone. Tonight the services will be in the Finnish church on Eighteenth street, the preacher being Rev. Mr. Mahone. From four to six hundred people have been attending these services.

**Needed Improvement.**—Polk street is to be improved and made link between the present county road and the Young's bay bridge in the near future. The work will consume the better part of a month.

**Potters Clay.**—Washington parties are said to be looking into the clay grounds in the neighborhood of Seaside, with a view to purchase, and perhaps, for the establishment of a pottery there later. The clay is said to be of extraordinary quality.

**Flavel On the Map.**—Flavel is to be put back upon Uncle Sam's map, and the postoffice re-opened for service. The postmaster will probably be named in a few days, and the people living thereabout will be in closer touch with their neighbors far and near.

**Funeral Services Held.**—Service over the remains of the late Mary Machado were held yesterday afternoon from Pohl's undertaking parlors and the interment was in Greenwood. The deceased was a resident of the Lewis and Clark and was stricken with paralysis.

**Out On Parish Work.**—Rev. G. E. Rydquist leaves this morning for a round of visits to his outlying parishes in the Nehalem country. He will be gone for the better part of a week and will look into the conditions and needs of the churches at Fishhawk and at Mist. There will be no Sunday services at the Astoria church on Sunday.

**Redmen's Masquerade.**—The local Redmen will give their annual masquerade ball on Wednesday evening next, at Ford & Stoke's hall. No pains nor expense have been spared to make this event the crowning social achievement in the history of the order here. The costumes will be beautiful and various and the finest music obtainable will add to the many pleasures outlined by the managers.

**Portland Game Called Off.**—A game of football will be played between the Commercials and the West Astorians, on the local gridiron Sunday. A game was to have occurred between the West Astorians and Pupuns, but the contest was called off in order that the grounds could be used for a contest between the Commercials, and a team from the Portland Athletic club. The deal for the game fell through, however, and the West Astorians were substituted for the Portland team.


