New York Bunco Man Impersonates Anheuser.

ORDERS "SOME OF MY BEER"

Stranger Asked to Join Alleged Brewers in Friendly Drink and When He Produces Roll of Bills to Pay, It is Snatched from His Hands.

New York, Nov. 24.—Max Cohen, a bunco man, who is known as "Sheeny Mike," was yesterday sent to Sing Sing prison for seven years. Cohen tried to swindle Davis Landon, of San Francisco, out of \$4.50.

Landon was stopping at the Vendome Hotel, and met Cohen, who said he was "Mr. Anheuser, the beer man." Then Cohen introduced Landon to another man as "Mr. Busch, my partner."

They sat at a table in the cafe and Cohen ordered "Some of my beer—you know—Anheuser-Busch." There was a dispute as to who should pay, and it was suggested that Landon had no money to pay with, anyhow. He produced a roll of \$4.50. "Anheuser," grabbed the money and "Busch" grabbed Landon. In the scuffle that followed Cohen was caught but his partner escaped.

Landon's story kept the audience in the court room laughing. "It is a funny story to hear," said Judge McMahon in sentencing Cohen, "but this bunco business has got to be stopped."

AUTHORITIES ON TRACK OF SMUGGLED DIAMONDS

Gems Carried Past Boston Customs Officials and Later Stolen Will Now Be Confiscated by Government.

Chicago, Nov. 24.—Information was filed in the U. S. District Court, yesterday by Assistant District Attorney Goodman, to seize twenty-three diamonds, valued at several thousand dollars, said to have been smuggled past the custom officials at Boston.

The confession that the goods were smuggled into the United States was made by Henry Hoffman. A few days after the arrest of Mrs. Lena Becker here it was learned that the woman had been employed in a diamond robbery in New York. The woman is believed to be an accomplice of Hoffman, and has been indicted by the New York authorities.

When the Federal authorities here learned of the diamond robbery they decided to hold the gems and unless Hoffman can show good reasons for not doing so, the gems will be forfeited.

DOCTRINAL DIFFERENCES OF BAPTISTS HAVE PASSED AWAY

Three National Organizations Adopt Resolution Which Favors All Acting As One Denomination.

New York, Nov. 24.—"The doctrinal differences which once divided the two Baptist denominations have passed away, and there now exists no doctrinal differences which should prevent their acting together as one denomination."

This was the substance of a resolution adopted at a meeting of representatives of three national organizations, the

American Baptist Missionary Union, and the Baptist Publication Society here.

The differences referred to concern close communion which is now abolished after having been a part of the church practice for more than a century.

JEWS AIDING COUNTRYMEN.

Boston, Nov. 24.—Immigration inspectors announced yesterday the discovery of an organized plan in this city whereby Russian Jew peddlers in Boston and New York provide money for steamship tickets for destitute fellow countrymen to come to America and by which the value of the tickets and interest of 65 percent is collected after the arrival of the immigrant ship. The plan became known from a witness in a recent inquiry. The immigration officials regard the discovery as timely, inasmuch as it will give the authorities all over the country new facts to influence them in dealing with the situation next spring when a large influx of Russian Jew peasantry is expected.

\$10,000 AND A KISS

Rich Reward For President of Memphis Board of Health.

KEPT FEVER FROM THE CITY

Dr. Heber Jones Is Lucky Man and Mrs. James Robinson, Wife of Millionaire Pharmacist, Woman Who Administered Kiss and Surprised the Physician

Chicago, Nov. 24.—Ten thousand dollars and a kiss from a leading society woman, is the reward given to Dr. Heber Jones, president of the Memphis Board of Health, in recognition of his successful efforts in keeping the city free from yellow fever during the recent visit of the scourge in the Southern states.

The check was the result of a subscription list taken up by influential citizens, who quickly secured \$10,000. The kiss was not on the program for the formal presentation, which occurred yesterday. The society woman was Mrs. James S. Robinson, wife of the millionaire pharmacist.

Following the presentation of the check she walked up to the physician and without a word of warning kissed him squarely upon the lips. The action took Dr. Jones by surprise, but he soon regained his composure.

FIREMAN FATALLY HURT IN EXPLOSION AT WATER PLANT

Chicago, Nov. 24.—Frank Dug, a fireman, was probably fatally burned, and the villages of Grossdale, Hollywood, Congress Park, and LaGrange were without light and water during last night, as the result of the explosion of a defective boiler in the water plant of the LaGrange Service Co. Dug's hands' face, and arms were seriously burned and it was said by physicians that he will die. The financial loss is placed at \$2000.

COMMISSION MEN UP IN ARMS AGAINST GAME LAW

St. Louis, Nov. 24.—Commission men of St. Louis are up in arms against the new game laws recently enacted by the State Legislature, the statute being characterized as illegal from the fact, dealers allege, that they smack of class legislation.

It is stated that St. Louis firms are sending out printed matter telling of alleged discriminations the new law makes against the common people in favor of influential and wealthy gun clubs. The pamphlets declare that clubs have influenced legislation in forty-five states and territories. The notices say in part:

"Not only is every citizen of St. Louis deprived of the right to buy game or have it shipped to him from any point in the state or have it in his possession at any time, but he is prevented from receiving any game from any other state or city—so that St. Louis is the only large city in the United States so hampered and imposed on."

The laws are declared by the commission men to be selfishly unjust.

NOT HIS LEGAL WIFE

Heirs of George W. Brown Claim He Was Unlawfully Wedded.

ESTATE IS TIED UP IN COURT

In a Sensational Suit Filed at Denver, Relatives of the Dead Man Claim that When He Married His Wife, She Was Still Wife of a Man Named Eastes.

Denver, Nov. 24.—A suit filed today by Sarah N. Johnson Brown, James H. Brown, John H. Reddin, testamentary trustees of George W. Brown, deceased, alleges that Marie Fleming Everst Brown Eastes was not the lawful wife of Henry George Brown, and his three hundred thousand dollar estate is now held up in the district court.

It is claimed she was married to Henry George Brown, while she was still the wife of J. Clark Eastes, whom she married in St. Louis, April 15, 1903.

By reason of the alleged illegal marriage, the trustees claim the whole of the estate reverted back to Sarah N. Brown, deceased, from whom Henry Brown inherited the fortune.

He was charged with having sold nine tickets to speculators. Garnzy made no explanation, but declined to resign the class presidency.

DEFAULTER GUILTY

Peoria Banker Admits He Took School Funds.

SENTENCED ON FIVE COUNTS

Newton C. Dougherty, Prominent in Educational Work and Banking Circles Pleads Guilty in Court, is Sentenced and Taken to Penitentiary.

Peoria, Nov. 24.—Newton C. Dougherty, ex-president of the National Educational Association, ex-superintendent of the public schools of Peoria and ex-president of the First National bank of this city, today pleaded guilty to indictments charging him with robbing the school funds, and was given an indeterminate sentence of one to fourteen years, on each of five counts, was taken to Joliet at once.

Over one hundred indictments have been returned against Dougherty, and it is reported that the aggregate amount of his peculations will reach one million dollars.
